HISTORY OF 4TH C.M.R.

To Be Mailed Free to Ex-Members and Next of Kin.

The history of the 4th C.M.R. will be off the press in a couple of weeks and a copy of this beautiful volume will be mailed, free of cost, to every ex-member of the unit and to the next of kin of all those killed in action.

The canteen funds of the 4th C.M.R., at the disbanding of the regiment, were saved by the committee for the purpose of creating a practical memorial of the unit, and instead of the fund being frittered away in small relief and charity that would at best have been unfair, in view of the way ex-4th C.M.R. men are scattered over the Dominion, a book containing the full story of the battalion's magnificent record in the war, with maps and illustrations, and a complete list of the 4,500 men who served in the unit, with their service record, remains now as a valuable and unique remembrance to be shared from one end of the Dominion to the other.

Ex-members of the 4th C.M.R. are requested to mail their names, old regimental numbers and present addresses to Lt.-Col. H. D. Lockhart, Gordon, D.S.O., in care of Clarkson, Gordon, D.S.O., 15 Wellington street, west, Toronto. Next-of-kin of those 4th C.M.R. men who fall are to send their names and addresses and their claim of closest kinship to the same address.

The history is the work of Capt. Stewart G. Bennett, M.C., of the Royal Engineers, who prepared it from the official records at Ottawa and from information supplied by many officers and men of the 4th C.M.R. As no list of the present addresses of the 4,500 men of the 4th C.M.R. exists, it will be years before the history is fully distributed. A small quantity has been published for sale to libraries and collectors at \$3. any fund from this sale going into a second edition within six months, to be left in custody of the archives.

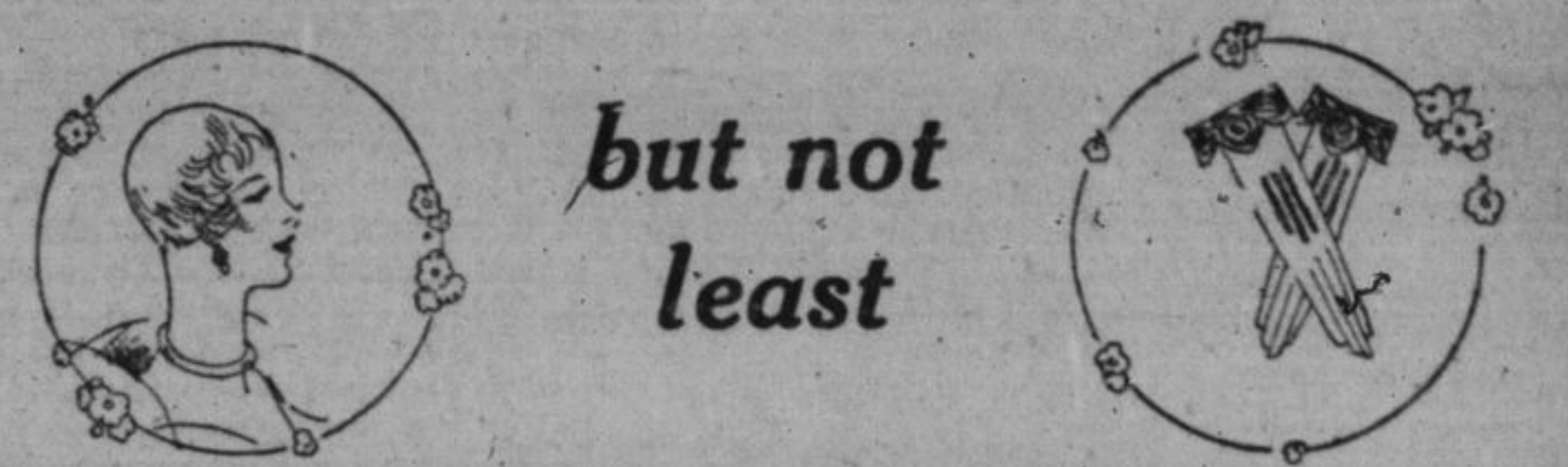
