WHEN CARDINALS CAME BACK AT YANKEES

N.Y. Yanks Tied Up the Series

Babe Ruth Smashed Out Three Homers, Breaking All Records.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 7.—The New York Yankees evened the World Series with St. Louis Cardinals by winning the fourth game here yesterday, featured by three home runs by Babe Ruth, 10 to 5. Ruth hit for the circuit in the first third and sixth innings, and smashed half a dozen World's Series records by his performance. Hoyt pitched a tight ball in the pinches for the winners while St. Louis used Rhem, Reinhardt, Bell, Halishan and Keen in the box.

Ruth's sensational clouting shattered string of records which he previously had tied. He brought his all time world's series total to seven, more than the mark set last year by "Goose" Goslin and exceeded the record of two homers for one game, held jointly by Ruth, Benny Kauff and Harris Hooper.

First Inning.
Yankees—Coombs struck out. Coombs let a fast curve break over the plate striking him out. Koenig struck out taking a called third strike. Ruth got a home run over the right field stands, hitting the first ball pitched. The ball fell into the adjoining street. Meusel got a base on balls, the fourth pitch being outside. On the hit and run play, Gehrig singled into right. Meusel went to third. On the throw in Meusel tried for the plate and was out. Southworth to Hornsby to O'Farrell. One run, two hits, no errors.

Second Inning.
Yankees—Lezzeri got a long hit into left for two bases and was out stretching it. Douthitt to Tevenow to Bell. Dugan popped to Tevenow. Severeid singled over the middle bag. Hoyt popped to Hornsby, who had to go back to make the catch. No runs, two hits no errors.

Third Inning.
Yankees—Coombs sent out a high fly to Douthitt. Hornsby made an easy play on Koenig's roller and threw him out. Ruth scored on another home run over the right field stands into the street. He was loudly applauded. Rhem tried to fool him with a slow one. It was Ruth's sixth world series home run. Meusel had to jump away from the

Fourth Inning.
Yankees—Gehrig struck out. He did not swing for the third strike. Lezzeri got a base on balls, the fourth pitch being outside. Lezzeri scored on Dugan's two-bagger into left, Douthitt and Hafey collided trying to make the catch, the two players were unable to arise to make play on Lezzeri, who rushed across the plate as the ball bounded away from Douthitt. Time was called and the outfielders of both teams were in the field. It was apparent that both players were badly shaken up. After a couple of minutes the two St. Louis outfielders arose and the Cardinals took their places in the field. The crowd cheered when it seemed that both players could continue in the game. Play was resumed. Severeid singled into centre and Dugan was thrown out at the plate; Douthitt to O'Farrell. Hoyt struck out taking a called third strike. One run, two hits, no errors.

Fifth Inning.
Yankees—Reinhardt went in the box for the Cardinals. After Reinhardt had warmed up a bit, Coombs came up to the plate. Coombs was given a base on balls. Koenig got a double into right and Coombs scored by fast base running. Ruth walked, the fourth pitch being outside. Hornsby came in and talked to Reinhardt. Meusel got a base on balls and the bases were filled. Koenig scored when Gehrig got a base on balls. The bases still loaded and Hornsby sent Reinhardt to the showers. Herman Bell was called into the box. Ruth scored on Lezzeri's sacrifice fly to Southworth. Meusel going to third on the catch. Gehrig holding first. Meusel scored while O'Farrell was throwing Dugan out at first. Gehrig going to second. Gehrig went to third on a balk. Severeid was purposely passed. Hoyt forced Severeid, Hornsby to Tevenow. Four runs, one hit, no errors.

Sixth Inning.
Yankees—Coombs beat out a hit to deep short. Koenig fanned swinging on a drop curve. Hornsby went over and talked to Herman Bell. Ruth hit another home run into the deep centre field stands, scoring Coombs a head of him. Ruth's hit shattered all world's series home run records. Meusel singled to right, but was out stretching it. Southworth to Hornsby. Gehrig pumped a long one into left for two bases. Lezzeri popped to Tevenow. Two runs, four hits, no errors.

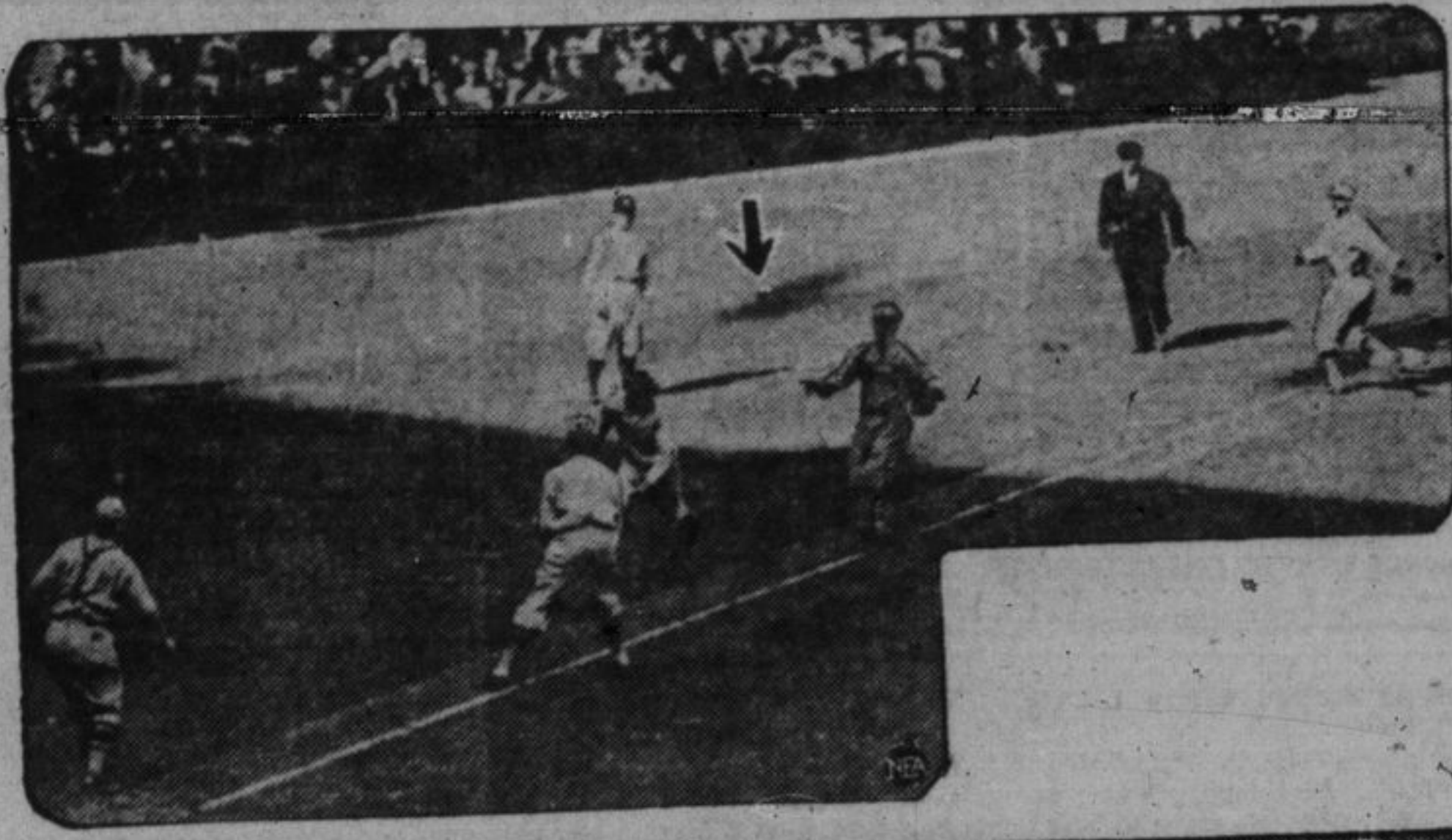
Seventh Inning.
Yankees—Halishan went into the box for the Cardinals. He is a left-hander. Dugan up. Hornsby gathered in Dugan's grounder and threw him out. Severeid singled for his third hit. Hoyt sacrificed, Halishan taking his bust and touching the bag. Severeid scored on Coombs' double to left. Koenig fanned for the third time. One run, two hits, no errors.

Eighth Inning.
Yankees—Ruth came to the plate. Ruth got a base on balls, the fourth pitch being low. Gehrig sacrificed Bottomley to Hornsby. Bell took Lezzeri's grounder and touched Ruth out as Ruth slid back to the bag. Dugan walked. Bases were filled. Severeid fouled into Ruth hands on the Yankees' bench. Severeid fouled again out to Bell. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Yankees—Southworth filed out to Coombs. Hornsby shot a hot single into right. Bottomley went out. Dugan to Gehrig. Hornsby going to second. Hornsby scored on Bell's single to centre. Hafey fouled to Severeid. One run, two hits, no errors.

Final Inning.
Yankees—Keen into box for Cardinals. Hoyt went out Tevenow to Bottomley. Douthitt captured Coombs' fly. Koenig went out Keen to Bottomley. No runs, no hits, no errors.

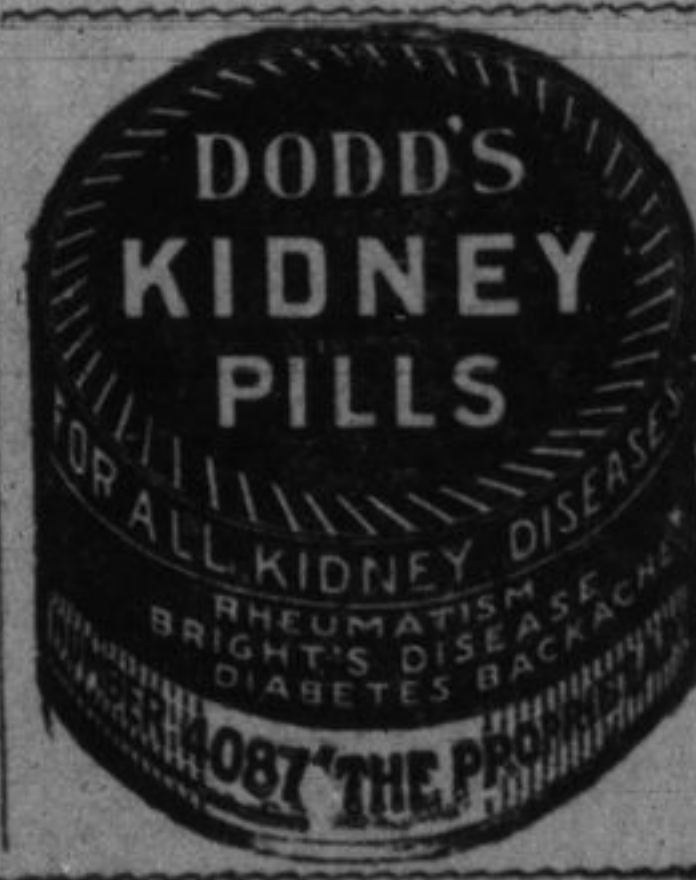

Cardinals—The stands applauded Ruth as he went out into left field. Douthitt went out by the Koenig-Gehrig route. Southworth got a Texas leaguer into centre for his second hit of the game. Hornsby struck out swinging for his third strike. Hornsby went out on three pitched balls. It was a pitchout but Southworth did not get down. Lezzeri threw out Bottomley at first. Hoyt used a half speed curve all during the inning. No runs, one hit, no errors.

Cardinals—Lezzeri stole a hit away from O'Farrell, taking his grounder near second and throwing him out. Tevenow sent up a weak fly to Gehrig. Rhem fanned, taking a third called strike with the bat on his shoulder. No runs, no hits, no errors.

Cardinals—Koenig made a nice running catch of Bell's fly. Hafey got a single over the middle bag. Meusel came in from right field to second base and the players gathered around him. The trainer was called and it appeared as if Meusel was ill. He washed his mouth out several times with water. The trainer talked to him for several minutes after which he went back into right field. Play then was resumed.

In the afternoon there were ten events and, as a grand finale, the obstacle race for recruits, which is held instead of initiation. Every recruit when he had finished the obstacle race had the feeling that he had accomplished a wonderful feat, and he certainly had, for the obstacles were made as difficult as they could be. The winner of this race was Waterspoon of "A" company, who won the T. L. Church Cup for the event.
