That the week beginning with November 14th will be observed as the Y.W.C.A. week of prayer throughout the world. Each day has its special subject which will be announced later. Our local "Y" is making a successful effort to increase its usefulness and it is hoped will be better equipped than ever to carry on its work for girls and women.

That our Kingston girls and women are admired when they go abroad. One pretty Kingston girl who is staying in England was snapped three times in Hyde Park recently and her picture appeared in three well-known London papers.

That soon we will be more or less shut into our houses. Let us see that they are well aired every day and that we sleep with our windows open. In this way we will keep away much of the illness that comes with the cold weather. If you get a chill take baking soda and water, a teaspoonful to a cup of water. A well known physician in Detroit says that should break any cold.

That echoes of the terrible disaster at Miami, Fla., are still coming to us and a Toronto Canadian press note says, Mrs. George Lovie, in her letter to a sister in this city says: "Our little house withstood the terrible wind and is the only building left on the street that was not either blown down or had the roof carried off. The house was full of people, as we took in all we had room for, and if the windows had broken in we would have been gone. During the height of the hurricane I was on my knees for four hours mopping up the water or we would have been flooded out of the house. I was also able to shelter several women with their little babies, and no doubt saved their lives."

That from the meeting of the Dominion board of the W.M.S. of the United Church come these heartening stories that give the workers courage. One was of a small lad in Newfoundland, having become imbued with the missionary spirit, recently made his mother a life member of the Women's Missionary Society of the United Church by selling newspapers and running errands. A humble woman in an Eastern town, who earned a modest living by scrubbing, put \$5 in her missionary mite box last year by systematically saving the mites. In Saskatchewan there exists a W.M.S. auxiliary composed of three former Presbyterians, three former Methodists, three Anglicans, two Roman Catholics and three who have never been associated with any society. Some of these members drive 20 miles to attend an auxiliary meeting and generally all are present.
