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

\$250,000 ASKED FROM THE OTTAWA DISTRICT

For Queen's Endowment Fund—Principal Taylor Gives Address.

(Ottawa Journal)
"We make no apologies for asking you to look on the raising of this large endowment fund in the light of a great Canadian service." That was the way one speaker put the matter at the banquet last night in the Chateau Laurier which inaugurated the Queen's University Endowment Campaign in this district.

It was a great gathering of the Queen's alumni from Ottawa and district and many distinguished men were on hand to wish the campaign well. Principal Bruce Taylor was the chief speaker and put the objects and reasons for the campaign squarely before the gathering. It was announced during the evening that yesterday one subscription for \$10,000 was received, the donor to be announced later.

Sir Robert Borden, chancellor of Queen's University, presided over the large and enthusiastic gathering. The other speakers were C. H. Bland, who spoke for the Ottawa branch, Queen's University Alumni; Dr. F. W. C. Mohr, who spoke for the McGill Alumni; Mrs. J. J. Dunlop, representing the Alumnae of Queen's; S. J. Cooke, representing Toronto Alumni; and Prof. D. McArthur, of the Queen's Staff.

It was one of the largest gatherings of Queen's supporters ever held in Ottawa and enthusiasm for the old school ran high during the evening. Queen's yells and songs were interspersed with the food courses and later in the evening dancing was enjoyed. Several reels of motion pictures showing the famous Queen's rugby team, three years Dominion champions, and scenes and events around the university of to-day, were shown.

Queen's University was asking for \$250,000 from the Ottawa district and several millions from the whole of Canada to increase its endowment fund, said Principal Taylor.
