JACK DELANEY IS RING'S JINX MAN

Light Heavyweight Champion Has Had an Uphill Fight During Boxing Career.

Jack Delaney, champion of the light-heavyweight division, is also a hard-luck champion. It is open to question whether any fistic ruler has had his march to the title halted by so many breaks in his health. A good part of the six years that Delaney has been boxing professionally has been spent in the care of doctors.

While training for the second bout of his career he displaced one of the knuckles of his right hand and he was incapacitated for nearly four years. In the second fight the first punch of his opponent broke one of Jack's ribs. He won this fight, but was forced to spend five weeks in a hospital after the bout and was advised if he had taken another blow over that broken rib the bones would almost have certainly pierced his heart with fatal results.

BASEBALL PROBLEMS.

Schooner Races Will Be Held This Month

Halifax, Oct. 9.—The Bluenose, champion fishing schooner of the North Atlantic, and the new and untried Hallowigan will compete off Halifax this month for the championship of the Nova Scotia fleet of salt bankers. 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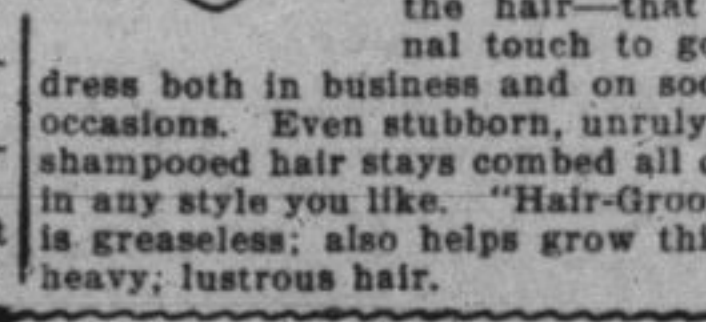
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
