An Extraordinary London Wedding

London, Oct. 11.—The first Church of England marriage service ever conducted in Esperanto united Muzza Schonau, an Austrian, and S. Jackson Coleman, London barrister.

Their courtship was carried on entirely in Esperanto. The two do not know each other's native language, and plan to speak the "international" tongue throughout their married lives.

The bridegroom, or "Edriknolino," said that he had found Esperanto excellent for love letters. In it "one can express love more strongly than in any other language."

He added that Fraulein Schonau had made a vow never to marry a man who did not know Esperanto.

She had refused to marry three other suitors on that ground.

Fraulein Schonau is the niece of a court musician to the late Emperor Franz Josef.

Lord Haldane, and the Austrian Minister in London, attended the ceremony in St. George's Church.

The organist wrote a special Esperanto hymn for the occasion.
