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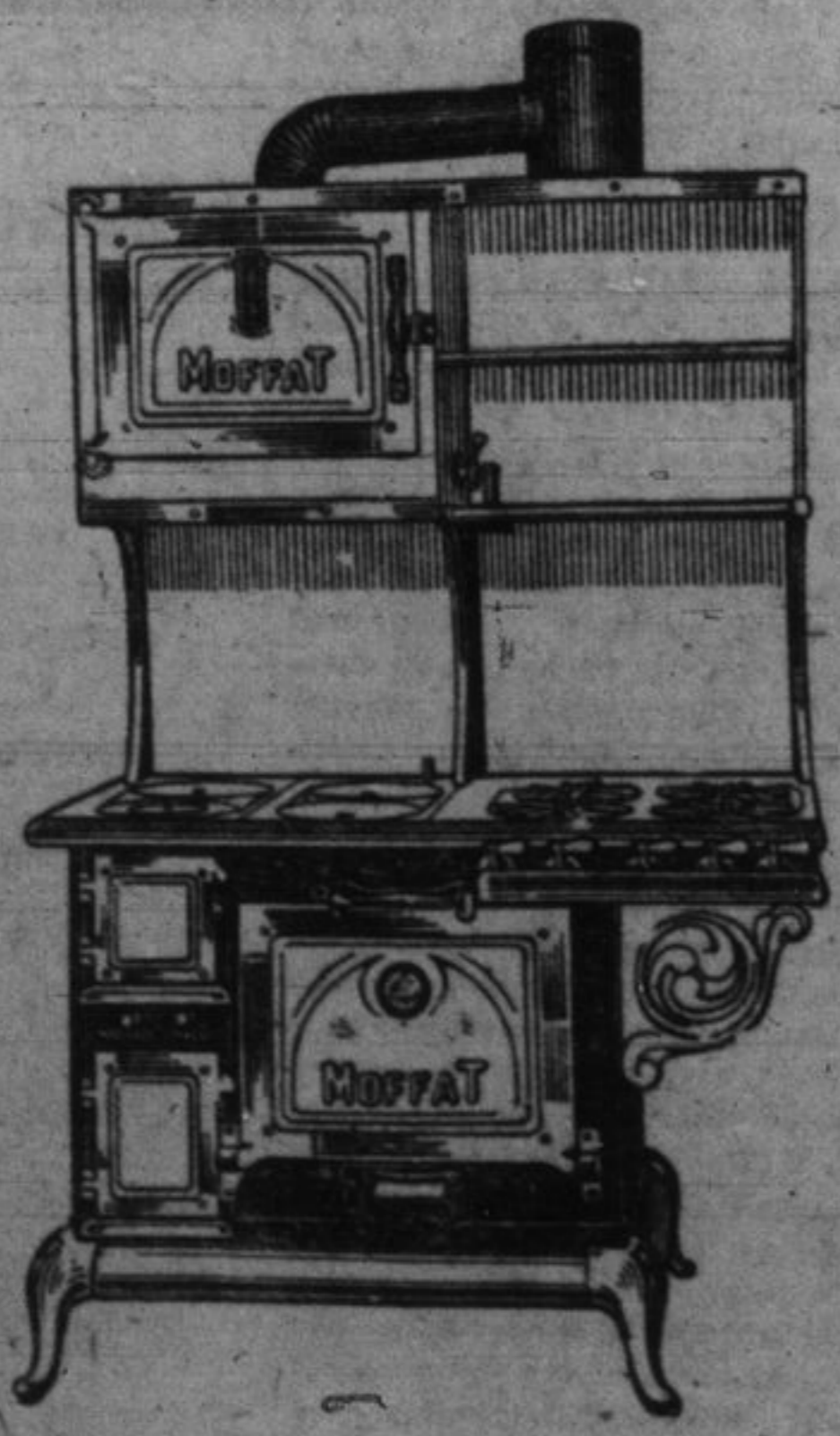

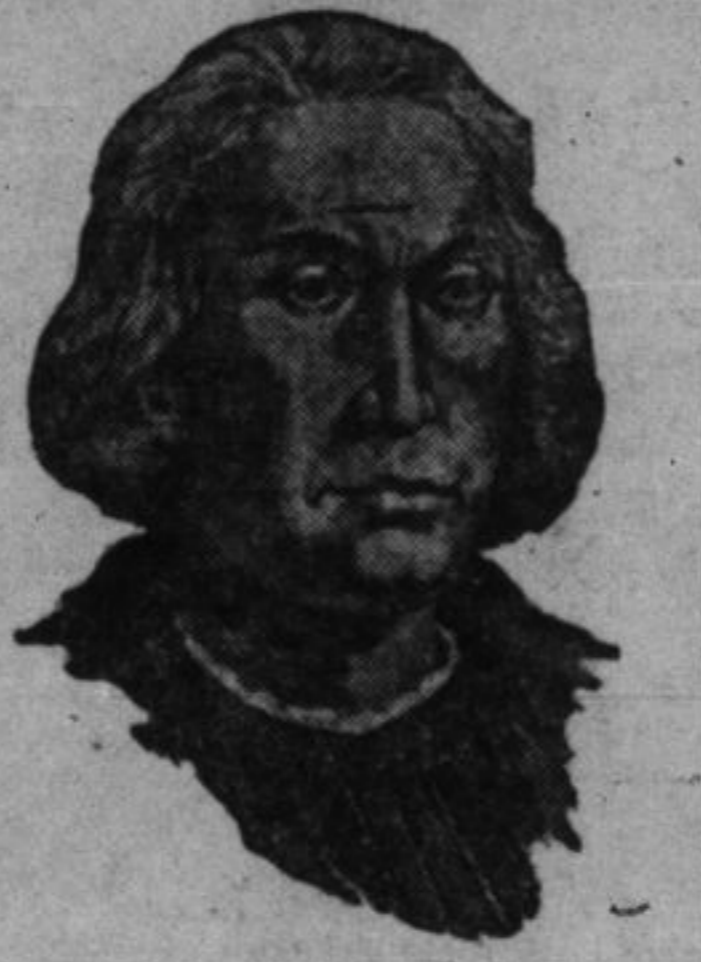

This is Columbus Day
Bishop Ingram at the Tomb of Abraham Lincoln.
Sir.—May I call attention to that very gracious act of courtesy performed by His Lordship the Bishop of London, England, at the tomb of America's greatest citizen, the martyred Abraham Lincoln. Many in reading this would pass it over as a very ordinary thing. I beg to call attention to the fact that it was a very extraordinary thing, and the impression it made on me was the fact that our excellent Bishop was paying tribute to the character of this former mighty president of the great American Republic, it was this that led our excellent Bishop of London to kneel at the tomb of the rail-splitter, who brought that unholly slavery of the negro race, to a victorious end.
America may well be proud of Abraham Lincoln, when we remember at the beginning of the great war, the late President Wilson said, "We are too proud to fight until at last it was a question whether America was to retain her independence or become a vassal state of the huns, who were seeking to smash the world's freedom." It seems to me that the memory of Abraham Lincoln gripped the American nation and they rose up in their might and said "If we don't dam the huns, they will dam us. This must be the attitude to-day against all slavery, against all despotism.
We glory in the splendid leaders of our historic Church of England, who recognize the secret of true greatness in God, who has raised the little cabbage garden of England to be the greatest empire under the sun because her power has always been on the side of right, and opposed to all wrong. Bishop Ingram's kind act binds two nations closer together, helps to secure a greater peace than all the Leagues of Nations combined. One touch of nature makes the whole world kin. Let politicians fight over pigeon-feed politics, but this is statesmanship that we believe in. May we recognize the importance of these kind acts of our leaders as an important example to our children. Righteousness exalts a nation, sin is a reproach to any people.

Civic Property Committee Will Call for Tenders for the Work.
