No matter how particular about keeping their food from contamination, they are they will be satisfied with what they see there. They will be taken by Dr. Laurie to see the great cold-storage plant that keeps everything ice cold, they will see the milk poured over cold coils into a spotlessly clean sterilized vat and the bottles sent along by machinery to be filled and then go back to have the top put on without the touch of a human hand. Then they can see the machines for pasteurizing the milk that does not come from the Hemlock Farm and they will be taken into the cold storage where the thermometer stands at zero where the velvet ice cream is kept. The laboratory is upstairs and here the milk is tested. Few people in Kingston realize that we have one of the most up-to-date plants in Canada in our little city, but a visit will soon convince them that we have. If they care to they can visit the stables where the fine horses are kept and see the barn in which the red and gold carts stand, free from dust and ready to start on their rounds long before we think of opening our eyes upon another day.

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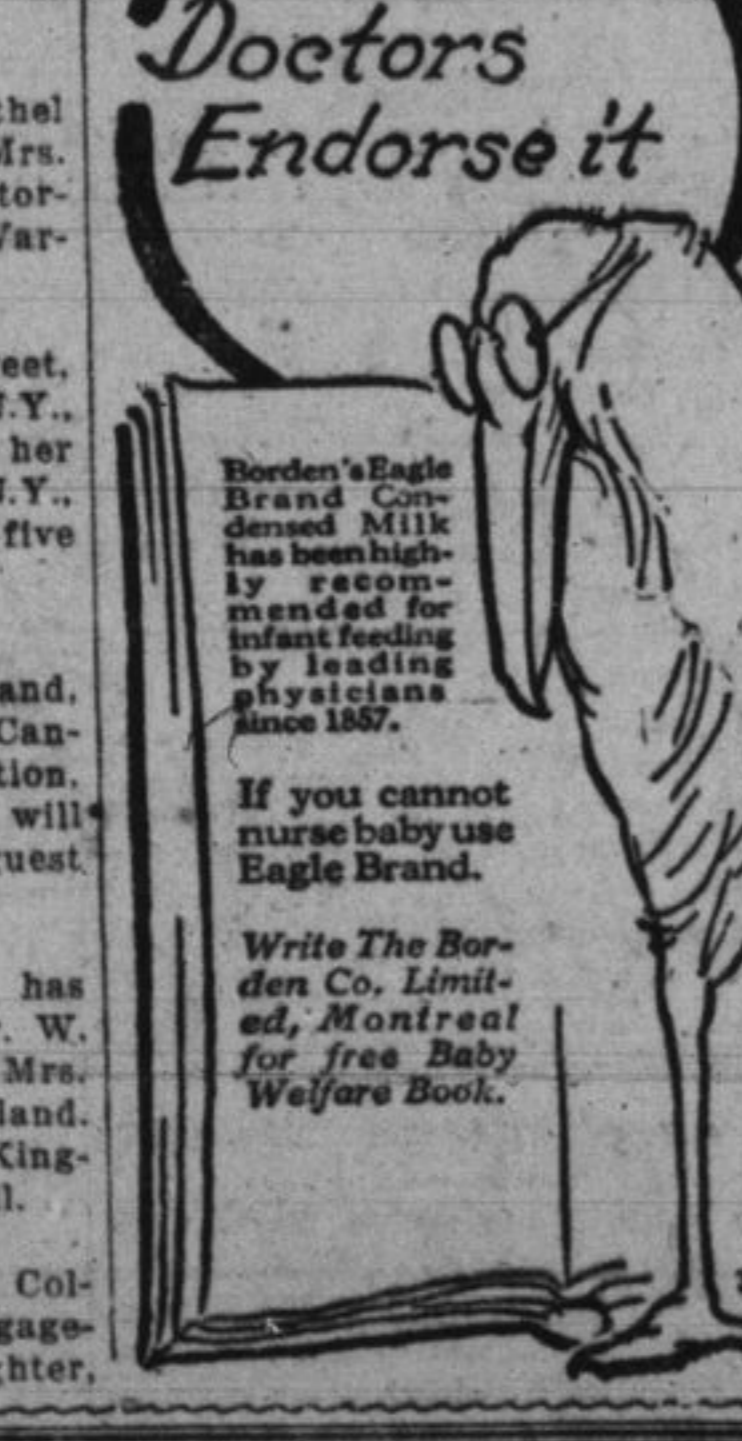
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
