Miss Carmel Cooper and J. Barrett, Kingston, were the guests of Mrs. Bolger, North street, on Sunday.

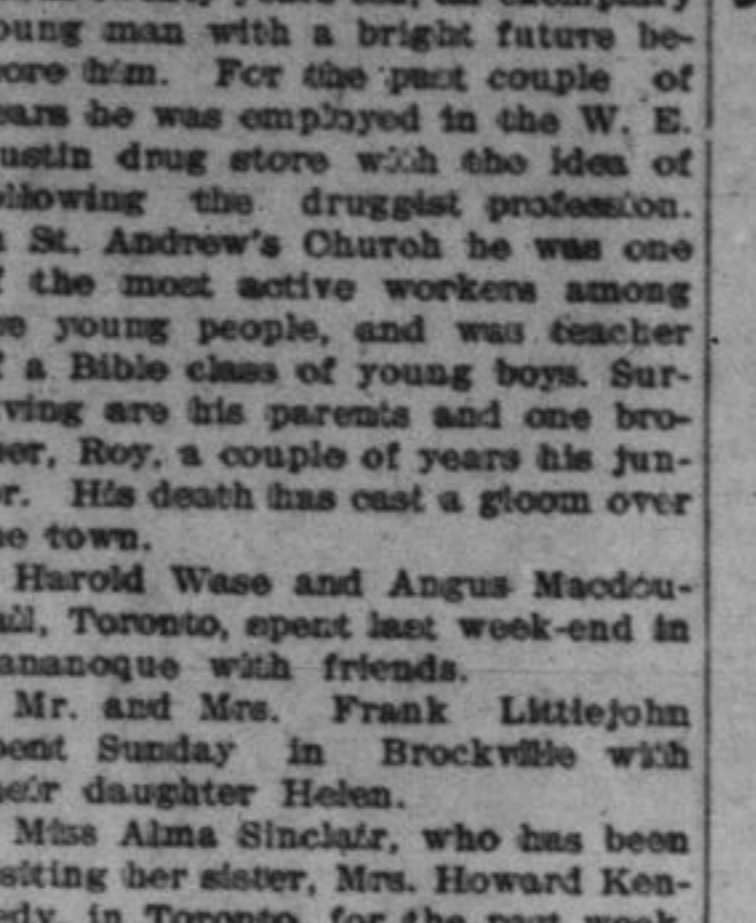

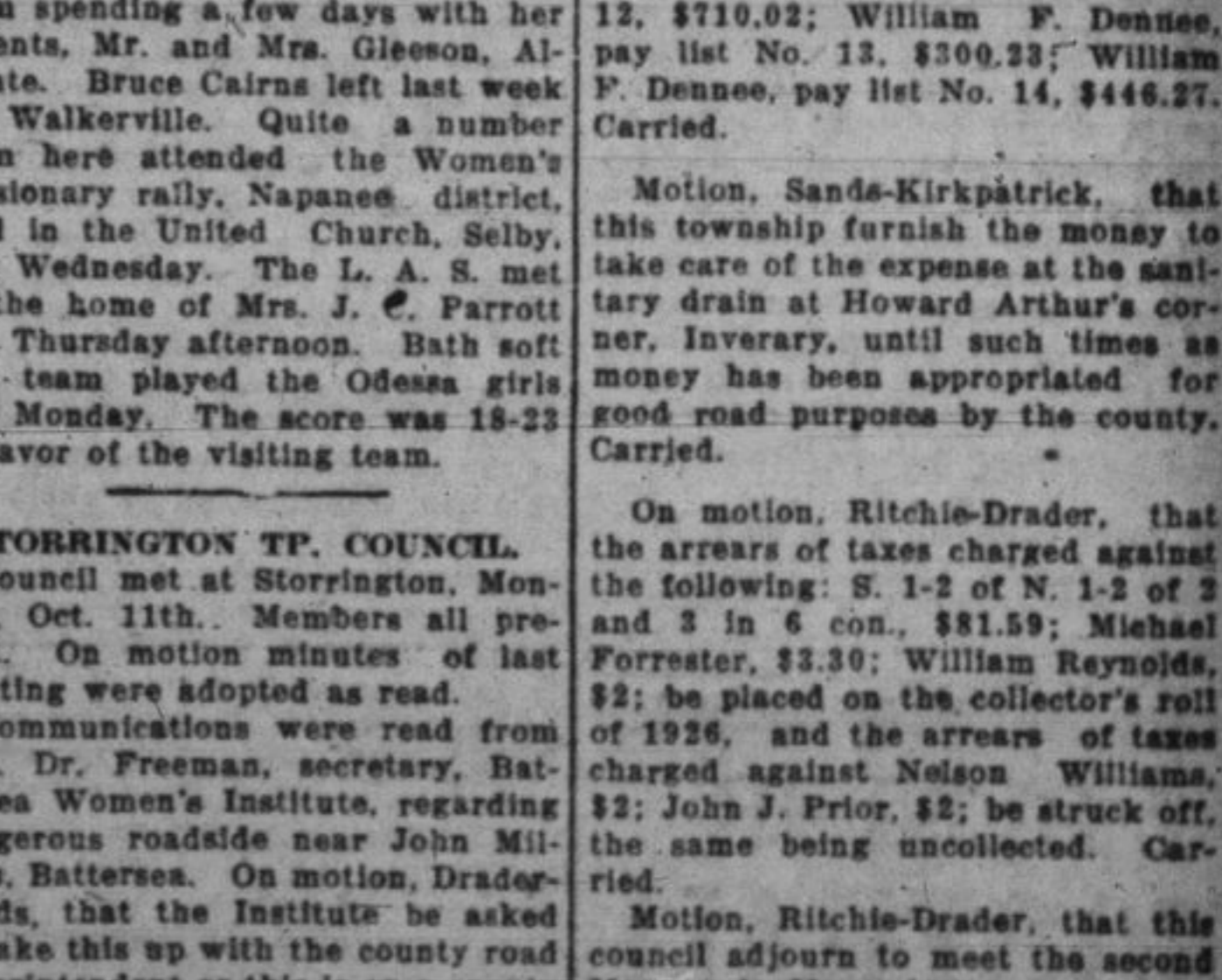
