ARRANGE PROGRAMME FOR QUEEN'S RE-UNION

Initial Organization of the International General Alumni Association.

The Queen's Re-Union programme is now practically complete, and was given out by Prof. M. B. Baker, chairman of the re-union committee, on Tuesday morning. It is as follows:

Saturday, Nov. 6th—Annual alumnae meeting all day, with dinner in Grant Hall in the evening.

Sunday—Mass meeting to be held at Grant Hall in the afternoon, to be addressed by Principal Dr. R. Bruce Taylor.

Monday—Ceremony in connection with launching the new Students' Union; in the afternoon the Queen's vs. Old Boys' football team; in the evening Alumni dinner in Grant Hall.

Tuesday—The initial organization meeting of the International General Alumni Association of Queen's. This is the biggest thing during the whole re-union, and morning meetings will be held from Tuesday onward until the work of organization is completed. In the afternoon inter-faculty rugby between Medicine and Science, and in the evening class dinners, club dinners, reunions and meetings.

Wednesday—During the day the General Alumni organization will carry on and in the evening Principal Kent will be installed at the Queen's Theological College and the Faculty Players will give a production in Grant Hall.

Thursday—Class re-unions and visits around the city; Armistice dance in Grant Hall in conjunction with the Daughters of the Empire.

Friday—Inter-faculty football between Arts and winners of Science-Medicine game. Alumnae Society elections. Convocation in the evening, at which the Governor-General Lord Willingdon, will receive an honorary degree.

Saturday—Variety vs. Queen's, and in the evening the Alumni Re-Union dance in Grant Hall.

The Imperial Conference Is Now In Session

Premier King Has Luncheon With British Premier at 10 Downing Street.

London, Oct. 19.—Premier Baldwin in his opening speech at the Imperial Conference here today said the conference discussions would extend over the whole field of Imperial and inter-Imperial policy. It was desired to consider methods whereby the Dominions could be knit closer to one another, and also closer to the Mother Country, he said, and how the means of communication and consultation could be made more effective than at present.

Premier J. H. N. Hertzog of South Africa, emphasized the opinion that the future of the Dominions lay within the orbit of the British Commonwealth. He said, however, that there should be recognition of the nationhood of the dominions.

Premier Mackenzie King of Canada observed that recognition should be given the fact that each Dominion had its own problems to consider.

The gathering was marked by cordiality, and the first business of the Conference was the unanimous adoption of a message of loyalty to King George V. All the delegates stood as the resolution was put to the Conference.

Following the opening of the conference Premier Baldwin and Premier Mackenzie King had luncheon together at 10 Downing Street, the British Premier's official residence.

ENGLISH CHANNEL SWIM AT THE Y.M.C.A.

Harold Budreo's Team Still in Lead in Interesting Contest.

The distance of the two teams in the English Channel swim at the Y.M.C.A. was greatly increased during the swim Monday night. There were two teams of seven boys each. They swam for fifteen minutes in relay, the distance for the night being 134 laps for Harold Budreo's team, and 120 laps for James MacLaughlin's team. This brings the total distance for Budreo's team up to 357 laps, and for MacLaughlin's team up to 343 laps. The distance for Budreo is about two and a half miles, with the others close behind. Great interest is being shown in this swim, as the boys have so far swam for only thirty-five minutes, making two and a half miles. The total distance to swim is twenty miles, therefore the time will be about four hours and forty-five minutes, for the channel.

Queen's Needs Voss On Its Backfield

Since the defeat of the Queen's University team at Toronto last Saturday, there has been agitation to have Carl Voss, a rugby star, again don a Tricolor uniform. Voss would have made a vast difference in the game at Toronto. His presence was missed and there has been a stream of inquiries as to whether Queen's will induce him to come out again.

It is felt that unless Queen's is strengthened by the addition of Voss on the backfield with Chantler and Batstone, there is reason to feel that Queen's will not have an easy time for the balance of the series. Voss will make a wonderful difference.

For Mundell and Delahay to play again is out of the question. Mundell has reasons for not playing and he is not in shape to play. He has not been practising. Delahay, of course, has been out of the game for some time. Queen's may be able to get along without them but their hope is in Voss. Graduates and others who saw the game last Saturday, believe that with Voss in the game, Queen's will have an equal chance.

MYSTERY MEETING OF COUNTY LEAGUE

Secretary and Treasurer Not Given Official Notice of Intended Gathering.

The Sporting Editor of The British Whig received this morning a letter from Mr. J. D. Cosgrove of Wolfe Island, expressing great surprise to learn in the local papers that a meeting of the County Baseball League was held on Thursday afternoon last. Mr. Cosgrove states that he did not see the meeting advertised in the papers, nor, as treasurer of the league, did he receive any notice of such a meeting. Mr. Cosgrove declares that he is at a loss to know the reason, as he had some important matters to bring before the executive.

Mr. Joseph J. O'Neill, secretary of the Frontenac County League, who would naturally be expected to send out the notices for such a meeting, stated to-day, when asked the matter, that he did not send out notices to anyone and did not know anything about the meeting himself. He believed that the president of the league called a meeting without consulting the other officers.

PREMIER'S STATEMENT ON LIQUOR POLICY

He Pleads for Calm and Thoughtful Consideration of the Electorate.

Toronto, Oct. 19.—The Government, earnestly hopes that no person will be swayed by emotional appeals or the exhortation of those holding extreme views upon either side of the question, but that this great question will have the calm and thoughtful consideration of the whole electorate.

This is what Premier Ferguson said in a statement regarding his liquor policy.

"After a careful survey of the whole province, with particular reference to our social and industrial activities, and giving long and earnest thought to this difficult problem, I am convinced that from the standpoint of the moral well-being of the people our methods can be improved," he proceeds to say.

"With this object in view the Government proposes to amend the Ontario Temperance Act and substitute for the doctor an independent commission, who will have the authority to issue to all citizens over twenty-one years of age, who desire to purchase spirituous or malt liquors for their own use, an annual permit upon which shall be entered each purchase, and which may be suspended or cancelled at any time for abuse or misconduct.

Local Option Areas Remain.

"When the present law came into operation a large portion of the province had banished the sale of liquor under local option. The views so expressed will be scrupulously observed and no sale of spirituous and malt liquors will be allowed in these areas. The Commission may, however, establish at such places as it may select in other portions of the province dispensaries for the sale of spirituous and malt liquors in sealed packages to persons holding official permits.

"The Commission may, also, upon the request by petition of a reasonable number of resident ratepayers of any municipality in such latter portion of the province, requesting the sale of beer by the glass at tables in standard hotels, notify such municipality of its intentions to permit such sale, and unless, within a reasonable time, from the date of such notice the municipality passes a by-law under the option law against such sale, such permission may be granted.

"We propose to establish a Commission of competent members of high repute, to control the operation of the proposed measure, and to confer on such Commission full authority to use its discretion in making regulations and exercising its powers with the object of securing non-partisan administration of the act and in the interest of temperance improvement."

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UNDER ARREST FOR STEALING CHICKENS

Resident of Richmond Before the Court and Remanded.
