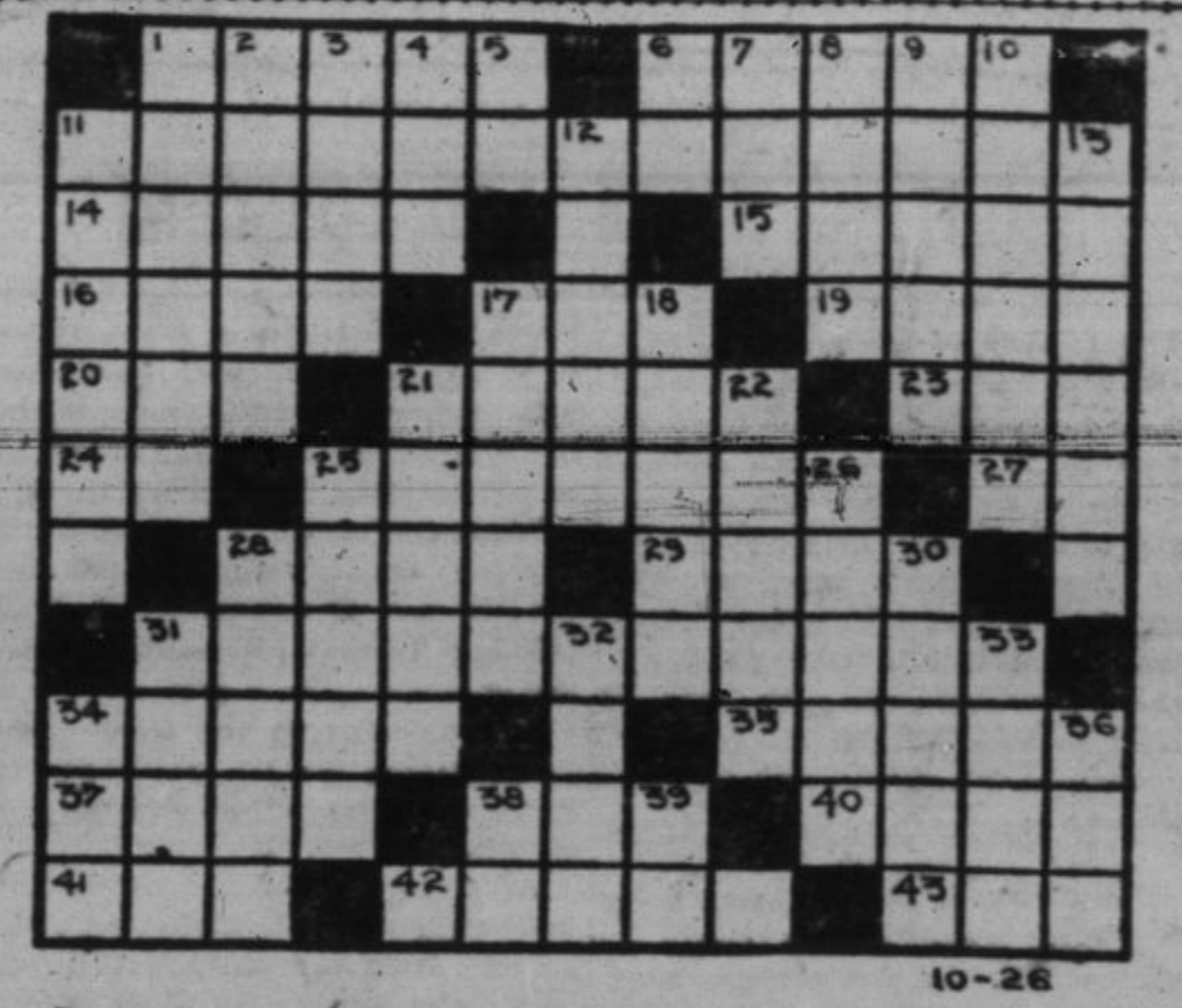

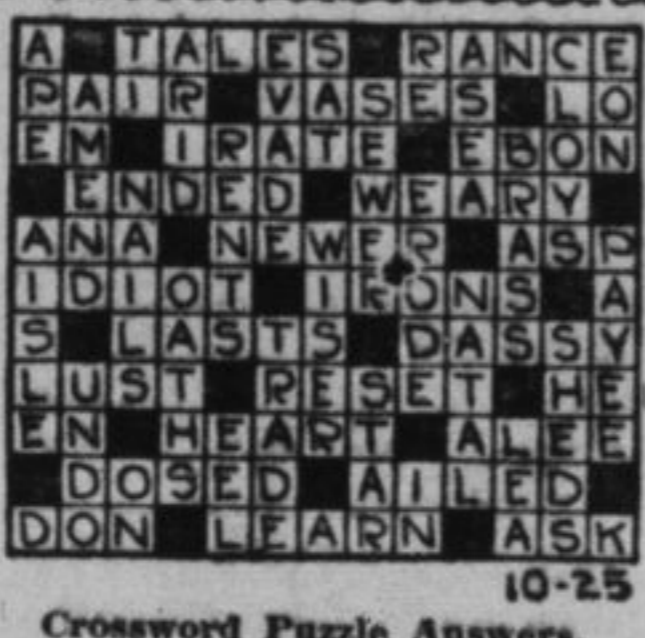

(Continued from Page 1.) years ago, Fire Chief Armstrong reported that a light was needed there and also said that ninety per cent of the people in that neighborhood, wanted the light.

As the matter is now before the Council again, the Commission took no definite action. The light would have been working some time ago, but for the opposition. As a rule the light is in favor of a new light, but in this case the order of things has been reversed.

Ald. George Boyd appeared before the Commission and asked for permission to string a light on a pole at the corner of Princess and Bagot streets, with a hand pointing towards his garage. The request will be granted, pending Ald. Boyd securing the necessary permission from the street railway company.

The Commission received tenders for a coke conveyor for use at the plant. The tender of the Linkbelt Company, Toronto, for a portable machine at \$233.50 was accepted, while the tender of the Dodge Company, Toronto, for materials, was also accepted.

The Commission passed favorably on four new street lights, located on Concession street, near Lansdowne; Sydenham street, between Ordinance and Bay; at River street bridge; at Alfred and Adelaide street.

The Chairman, R. N. F. McFarlane, presided at the meeting, and also present were Mayor Anrove, James Halliday, J. M. Campbell and James Harris.
