

AGENDA FOR BOARDS OF TRADE

Meeting of Associated Boards Will Be Held in Toronto on Nov. 18th and 19th.

The agenda for the annual meeting of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce to be held in Toronto on Nov. 18th and 19th, includes twenty-eight resolutions submitted by the boards of trade or chambers of commerce of thirteen cities or towns of the province. Important questions are dealt with in numerous motions which will probably cause considerable and profitable discussion.

The scope and importance of the coming meeting are indicated by some subjects covered by the resolutions including among others, Canadian Coasting Laws, National Conference for Tourist Traffic Development, Immigration, Taxation, Federal and Municipal, and Income Exemption, Enumeration of native born citizens as Canadians in the centennial census, extension of Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, Tourist Branch in Highways Department, observance of Diamond Jubilee of Confederation, Standardization of Canadian Products for Export and Succession Duties. With regard to the standardization of Canadian products for foreign trade the resolution was submitted by the Owen Sound Board of Trade. It is claimed that the British market offers excellent trade opportunities for Canadian producers and that in order to retain this market the quality of goods, especially food products, must be kept at a high standard. It is further claimed that Canadian shipments of

food supplies compete with like goods from countries where strict supervision by the government of the country of origin is necessary before exportation. The Owen Sound Board of Trade therefore suggests that the Dominion government enact that commodities intended for export comply with government specifications as to quality and shipping conditions and that their export be subject to government supervision. It is suggested that commodities for export be graded and branded under a uniform trade mark or label with the name or number of the producer or the packer.

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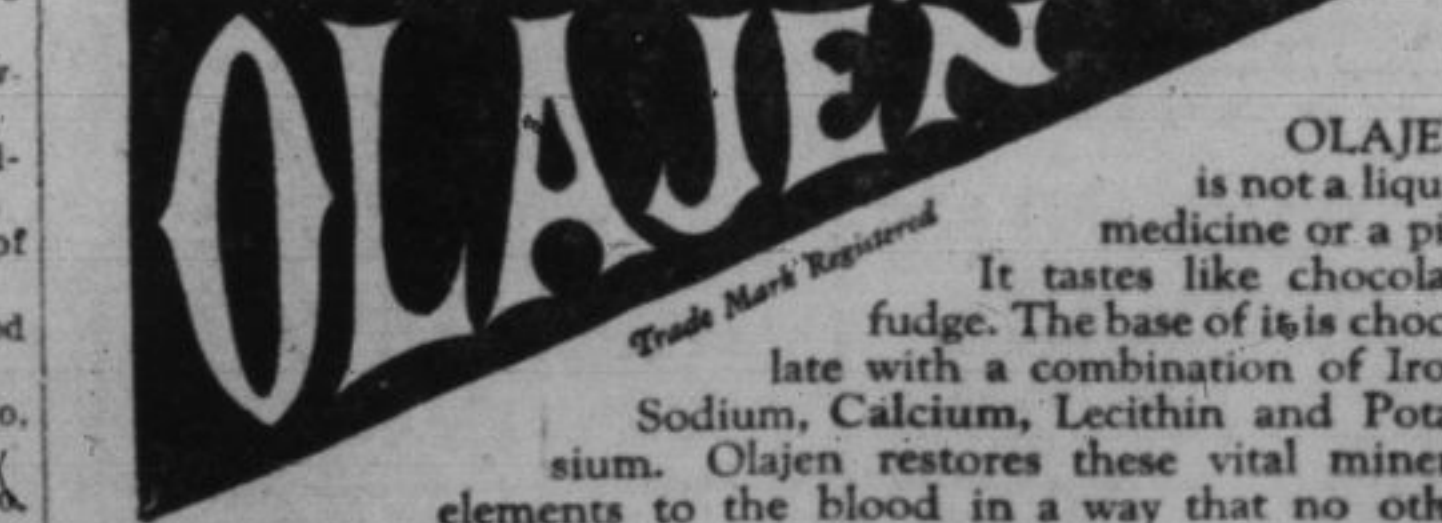
