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## PRESBYTERY PLANS TEMPERANCE DRIVE

Resolutions Passed at a Meeting in Cooke's Church on Thursday.

A special meeting of the Kingston Presbytery of the United Church of Canada was held in Cooke's Church Thursday afternoon, to form resolutions and make arrangements for the work to be carried out in the present temperance drive. The chairman for the session was the president, Rev. R. M. Hains Moon of Brockville, who spoke to the members of the Presbytery on the present situation in regard to the Ontario Temperance Act. He said that the issue was a very serious one, and that the church was interested only in the temperance end of the political issue. It is now up to the church to fight for that which has been gained through long years of fighting.

Several resolutions were passed, and drafted by a special committee, as follows:  
Moved by Rev. E. H. Burgess, seconded by Rev. Dr. W. T. G. Brown: "That this Kingston Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, meeting in Cooke's Church, Kingston, this 28th day of October, 1926, hereby puts on record its sincere and grateful appreciation of the conscientious courage, the self-abnegation and the high principle evinced by the Hon. W. F. Nickle, K.C., in resigning his high office in the Government, as a protest against a policy which he considered a menace to the best interests of the Province of Ontario. No man has had equal opportunity to form a true judgment of the value of the Ontario Temperance Act, and his reasoned conclusion that any improvement in the Ontario Temperance Act certainly does not lie in the direction of the policy commonly called "Government control," confirms our own conviction and strengthens our courage to defend vigorously and confidently the position already won by a long process of education and effort on the part of those who have cherished the ideal of a sober and moral province. "And we recommend that a copy of this resolution be sent to Hon. W. F. Nickle, K.C."

This resolution was carried with cheers from the members. "That this Kingston Presbytery of the United Church of Canada, meeting in Cooke's Church, Kingston, puts on record its emphatic disapproval of the action of the Premier of Ontario, in thwarting the repeatedly expressed will of the people of the province, by throwing the temperance question into party politics, and announcing a policy of so-called "Government control." This is, in our judgment, a retrograde step, and makes the people, whether they will or no, partners and distributors in a traffic which has always been a sinister and pernicious influence in our national life.

"This question transcends all party interests, and in the face of the undoubted jeopardy to the moral welfare of the province, we recommend that our people rise completely above party considerations and achieve a decision and final victory on this paramount issue.

"After mature consideration, we recommend to the members and adherents of the United Church of Canada, within this Presbytery, embracing the two counties of Leeds and Frontenac, that by their vote and influence they express their disapproval of the Premier's action by electing to the Ontario Legislature only such men as are openly and undoubtedly loyal to the Ontario Temperance Act.

"This, we believe, can be most easily and effectively achieved by refusing to allow any division of the temperance vote in any constituency, and we earnestly recommend the steady policy of avoiding any situation which would split such vote in any constituency."

Moved by Rev. G. A. Brown, seconded by Mr. Clifford Sine, and resolved:

"That the members of this Presbytery, recognizing the need of patient, faithful cultivation of the electorate that it may be won to vigorous support of the Ontario Temperance Act, make clear to their people:

"1. The Christian principles which lie behind the present temperance legislation.

"2. The present conditions as compared with those of a generation ago.

"3. The results of government sale in neighboring provinces."

Ellwood Fisher, the eighteen-year-old son of a Moscow merchant, was rather severely injured in an automobile accident in that village on Wednesday, when the Ford truck which he was driving, crashed into a horse which was crossing the road.

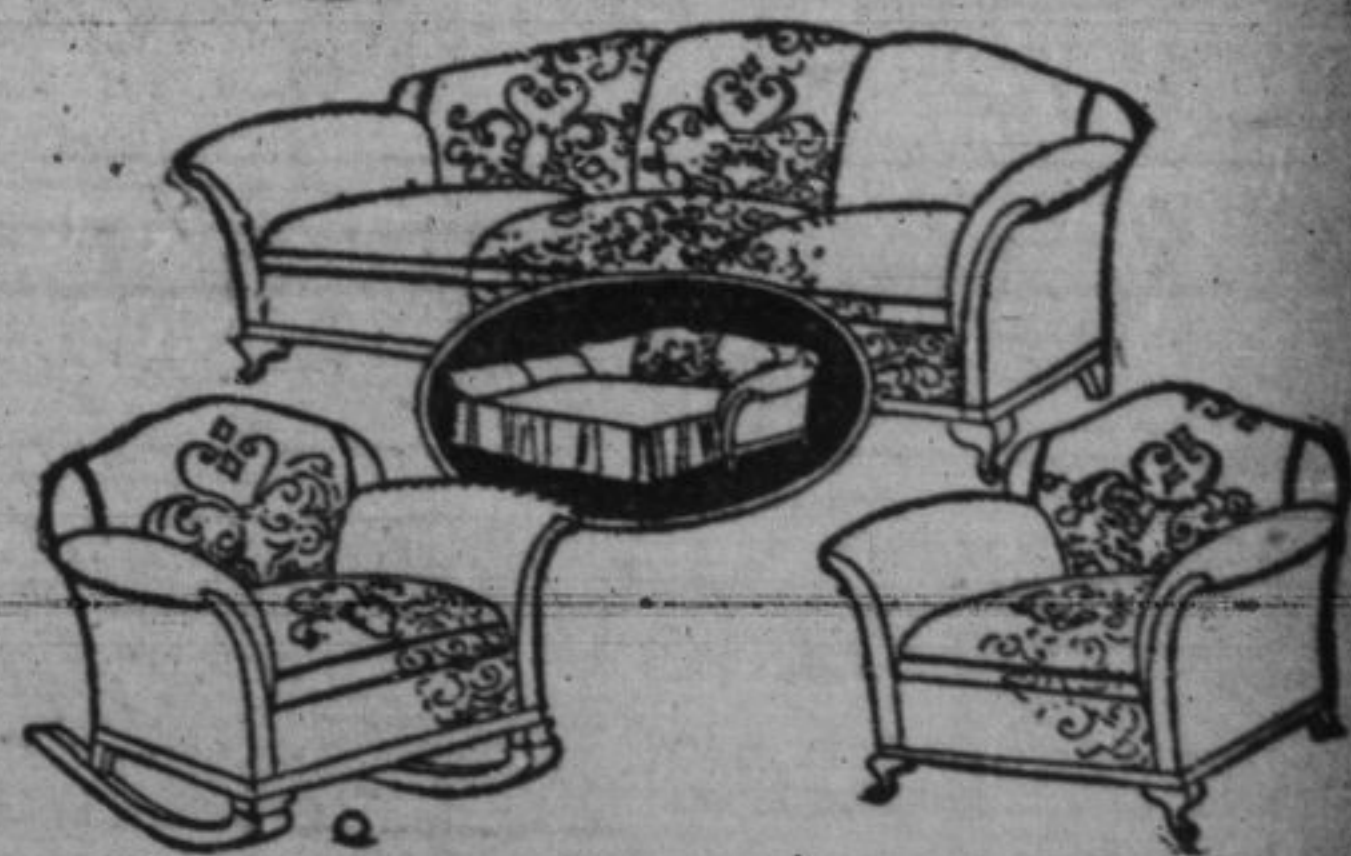
