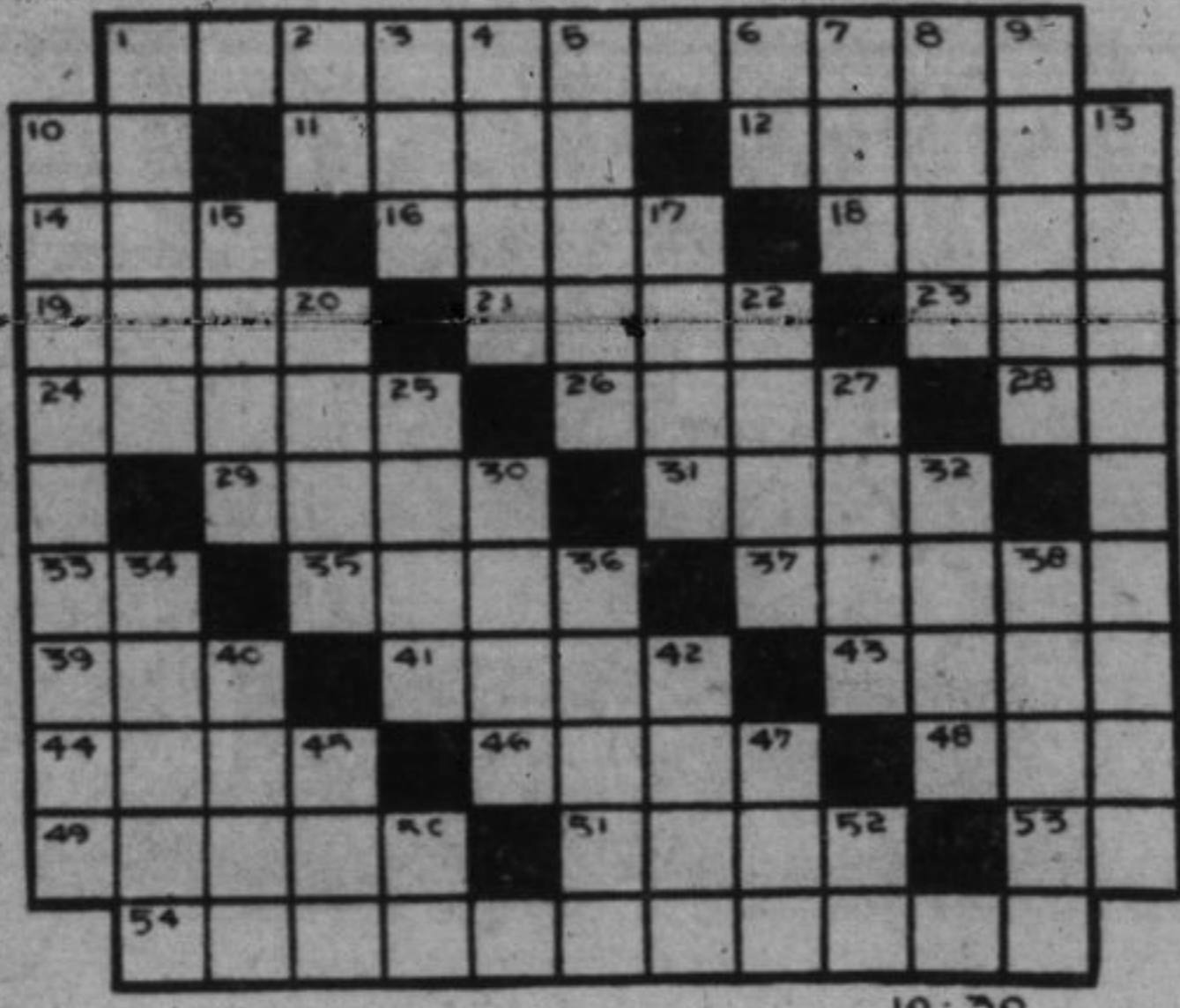

**Crossword Puzzle Answers.**

The right to enforce the egg grading laws, except in the case of exports. Under the British North American Act, according to this authority, grading of products for domestic sale, is a provincial matter. The decision will be appealed, but in the mean time, dairymen, who have developed important market with the sale of graded butter and cheese, farmers raising "select" grade bacon hogs and fruit growers, who stamp a grade on every box and barrel of apples which leaves their orchards, are beginning to wonder what will happen to their trade if the grading laws go. It will be a big job to get all the provincial governments to put through uniform grading laws, and even if this was possible, during the time necessary, all the advantages gained by years of grading would be lost. Export grading by the Federal authorities would be of little advantage to the producer, as the latter when he put up his fruit, eggs or dairy products just where it was going. The wholesaler who handled it, even if he saw a better chance by selling on the home market would have to ship it overseas while there would be absolutely no chance of the producer, for the domestic market, taking temporary advantage of a shortage and high price in Britain. Hog grading, which is now fairly generally accepted, would go by the board entirely.
