## ST. LUKE'S CHURCH 30TH ANNIVERSARY

Was Commemorated on Sunday—Late Canon Cooke Founded Church.

St. Luke's Anglican Church on Sunday held special anniversary services to commemorate its thirtieth birthday anniversary. During this long period the church has made wonderful progress. It was founded by the late Rev. Canon Cooke in the year 1896, on its present location. The present rector, Rev. J. de Pencier Wright, in the morning sermon said that the past records of the church offered great things for the future. His sermon was very appropriate for the occasion, telling of the gratitude and devotion to duty of the founder of the church. The edifice was beautifully decorated with white chrysanthemums.

The music was very fine, the anthem in the morning "Still, still with Thee," (Speaks) being sung by Mr. H. W. Ide and the choir. In the evening, the anthem "Seek Ye the Lord," (Roberts) was beautifully sung by Mr. I. C. Edwards and the choir. "How lovely are the Dwellings," (Liddle) was also rendered in a fine manner by Mrs. A. Hinks.

The special preacher in the evening was Rev. F. Archbold a son-in-law of the late Canon Cooke, founder of the church. He preached a very forcible sermon, dealing with the progress of the church, saying that the past had much to offer for the future. He outlined the use of the church. It is the place for men to repent of their sins and to receive redemption. The church was packed during both the morning and evening services.
