**M'GILL PREPARES TO MEET QUEEN'S**  
**Red and White Will Give Tricolor Terrific Battle.**

Montréal, Nov. 2.—Rugby football reaches the season's peak here at the week-end, when McGill and Queen's meet at the Percival Molson Memorial Stadium in the final scheduled Intercollegiate rugby fixture of the local season, and a battle which means either relegation to the cellar for the Red and White or a fighting chance for McGill to enter a three-cornered tie at the season's end in the series and the play-off series for the title which would follow such a deadlock.  
 McGill are far from upset by their reverse at Varsity last Saturday. The Red and White played smart football. The breaks went against them and they lost a close tilt by one touchdown. Victory would have placed them in an enviable spot in the race for the laurels, but they are far from being out of contention yet. Despite the fact that they were smothered by Queen's at Kingston in their first meeting of the season, McGill believes that the Red and White, playing the same football they showed in the two tosses with Varsity, have a good chance of coping the struggle here Saturday and keeping in the running.  
 And, on the question of weather, McGill is staking much. The Red and White want a dry field for their speedy backs. They had a dry grid-iron when they beat Varsity here, but in their two subsequent games ran into rain and heavy fields, which slowed up their main threat: from the backfield. It was a rainy October, the worst footballers have experienced since the war, and the damp Saturdays have not aided the tight McGill squad.

**ALD. PRICE TO RETIRE FROM CITY COUNCIL**


**He Will Complete Four Years' Service at the End of This Year.**

**ENGLISH CHANNEL SWIM AT Y.M.C.A.**

**Four Miles Have Been Covered So Far in the Race.**  
 Considerable distance is being made on the English Channel swim at the Y.M.C.A. On Monday night the Red team captained by Harold Budreo swam 122 laps of the pool and the Blue team, captained by James McLaughlin, swam 122 1-3 laps. This brings the total up to 636 laps for the Red team and 625 1-3 laps for the Blue team. Roughly this is about four miles or 22,260 feet, which has been covered in 80 minutes.

**Queen's or R.M.C. to Meet Loyola Team**

Montréal, Nov. 2.—Loyola College, Intermediate Intercollegiate champions of the Quebec district, will play either Queen's University Intermediates or Royal Military College in the Intercollegiate play-downs, the first game being scheduled for the Loyola campus here Saturday afternoon, the return game being at Kingston on Wednesday, Nov. 10th. Royal Military College has a small lead over Queen's seconds, the deciding tilt between the two being set for 40-morrow at Kingston.

**No Change in Student Elections Likely This Year**

The Arts Society at a meeting this afternoon named a slate for the coming Alma Mater Society election and it would seem that the election is to be carried out on the old faculty lines despite efforts to reform the system. Those who wished to do away with the faculty system realize that while in theory it is excellent there are many practical phases to be considered and that such a reform cannot come all at once. They are hopeful, however, that during the coming year a plan will be devised on which all the faculties can agree and that the new system will be in shape for next year's balloting.

**Prohibition in Kansas**

In reply to the question, "Does prohibition pay?" the Catholic Advance, the official paper of the Roman Catholic Church for the States of Kansas and Oklahoma, says: "As a direct result of prohibition Kansas has \$200,000,000 in banks and \$67,000,000 in mortgages in other States. It has \$600 per family in live stock. In Kansas there are fifty-four counties without any insane, fifty-four counties without any feeble-minded, ninety-six counties without any inebriates, thirty-eight counties without any poor-houses, fifty-three counties without any persons in jail, and 165 counties without a representative in the State penitentiary." Kansas has had prohibition in force longer than any other state, and its testimony ought to count for something in the prohibition controversy.

**Steamer Was Released**

According to information received in the city to-day, the steamer Simpson, which ran aground near Alexandria Bay, N.Y., was on Tuesday morning, released by the Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking Company. The rudder was lost and the vessel is being towed to Ogdensburg by the tugs Frontenac and Donnelly.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Alfred E. Blackaby, railway mail clerk, arrested Saturday on a charge of stealing letters from the mails, was sentenced yesterday to three years in Ports month penitentiary by Magistrate Jones.


