CONTRIBUTED RECIPES.

Black Cherry Wine. Five pounds of cherries to one gallon of water. Bring to scald. Strain, add three pounds of sugar to one gallon of juice. Add yeast cake to help ferment. Let stand three weeks or until it stops fermenting. Strain and bottle.
