CALGARY ALBERTAN SOLD.

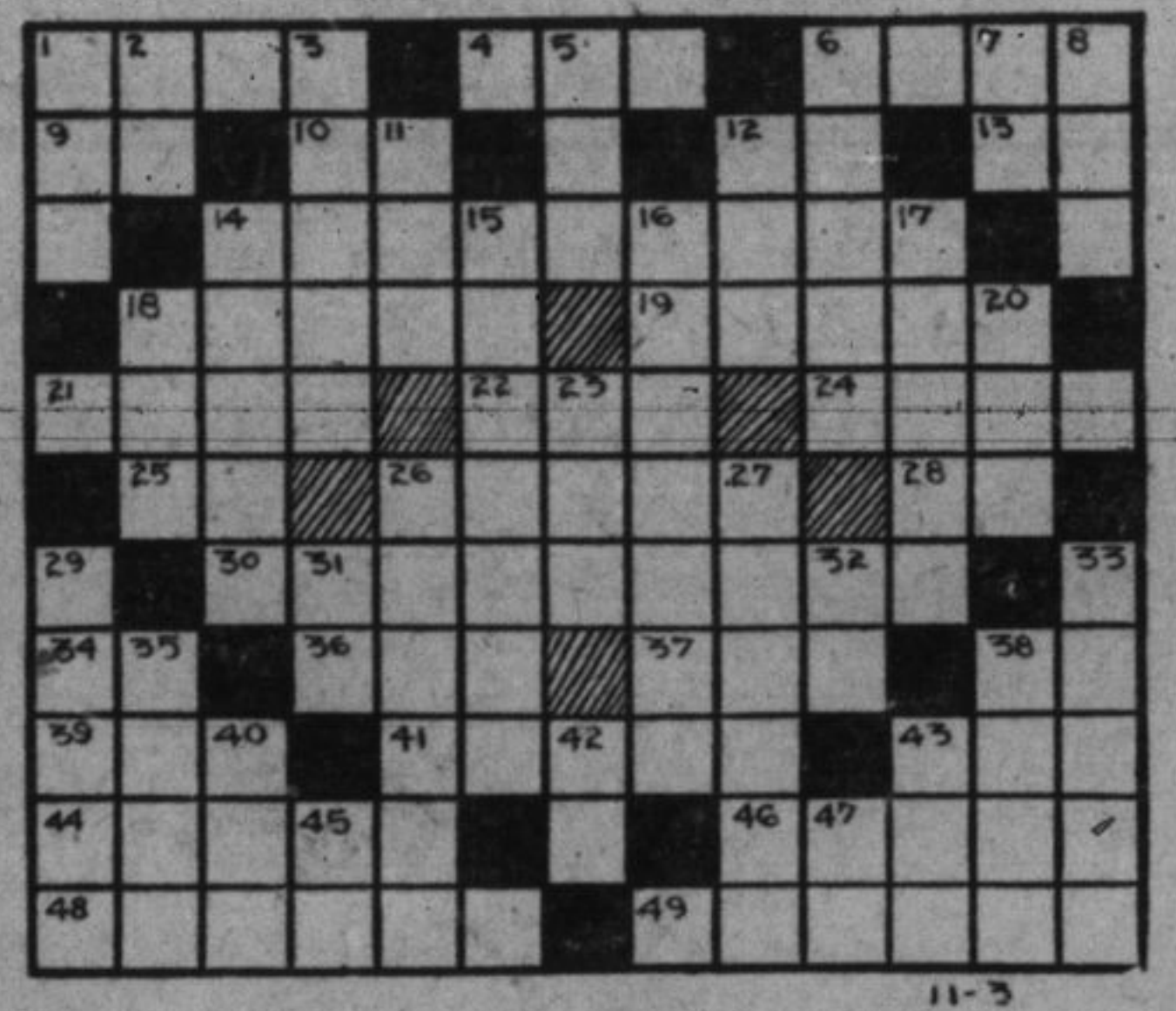
Secured by George Bell and Charles Campbell.

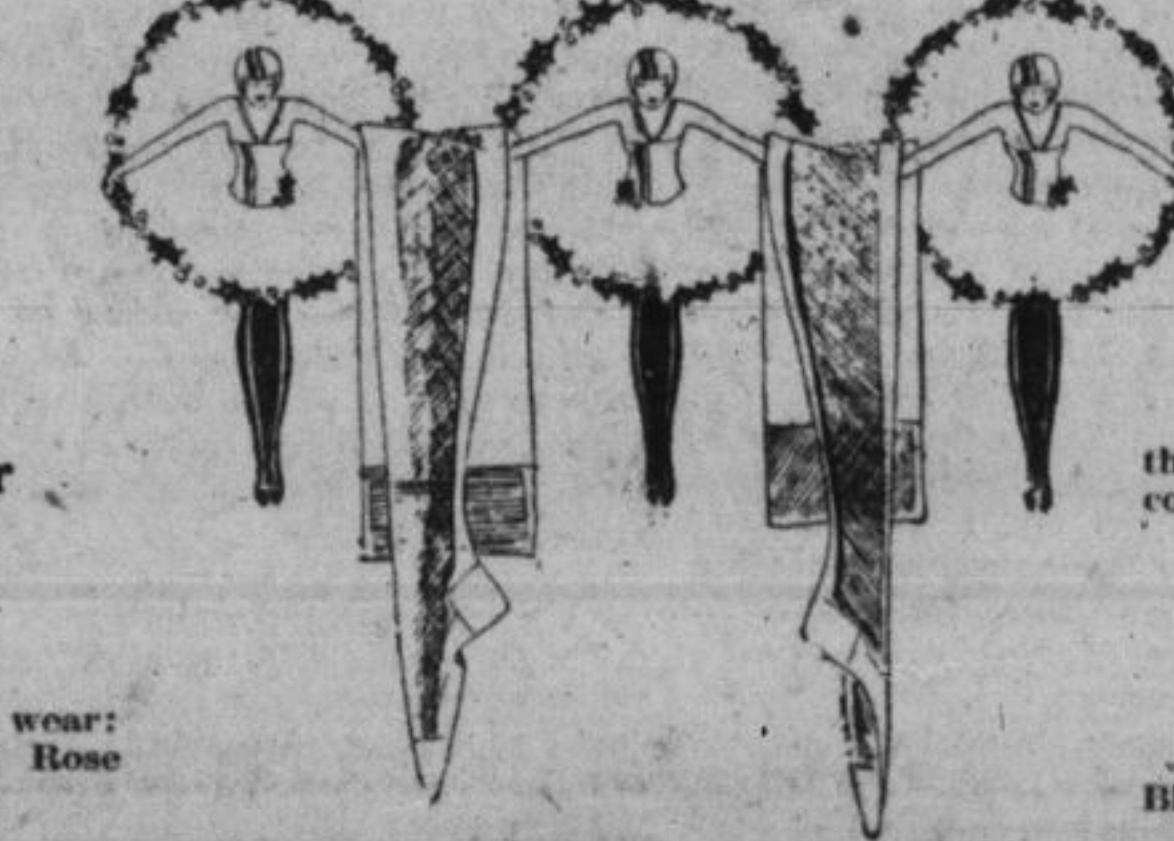

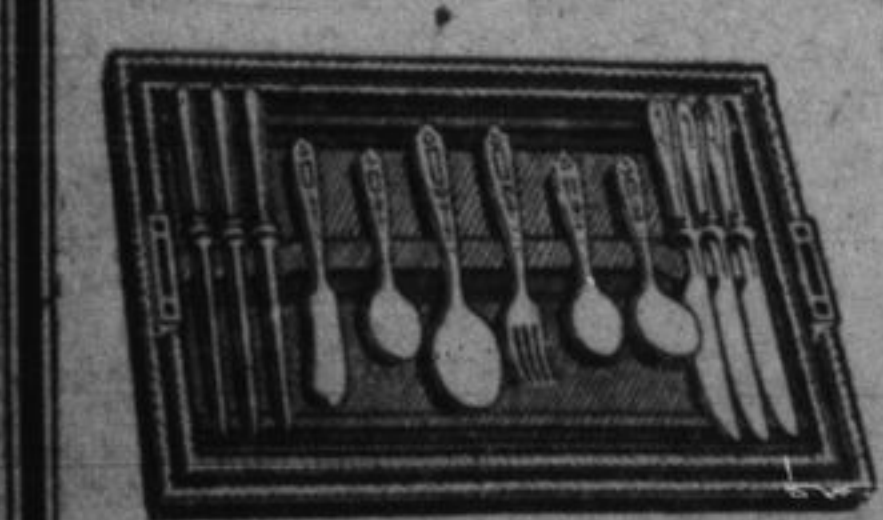
