**Retired on Pension.**

### THE MAYOR THROWS WRENCH IN MACHINE

**Conservatives Fear Election of Nickle if Two "Wets" Run Free.**

A determined effort is to be made during the next seven days by the campaign committee of the Kingston Conservative Association to prevent a three-cornered election contest in Kingston. What success they will meet with remains to be seen.

The situation at the present time is that Mayor T. B. Angrove has declared that he is in the fight and is going to run as a "wet" candidate whether he gets the Conservative convention or not. It would seem from the conversation of leading Conservatives that the mayor has little chance of getting the official nomination, so with the official Conservative candidate, when he is nominated, it puts two Government control supporters in the field.

As yet the Liberals have not been heard from and the party leaders have nothing to say at this juncture. Lurking in the background, however, is the spectre that Hon. W. F. Nickle will, when two "wet" candidates are definitely in the field, declare himself as a Conservative "dry" candidate and under such conditions even Mr. J. F. Sowards, president of the Kingston Conservative Association, from the purport of his remarks at the nomination meeting on Tuesday night, concedes Mr. Nickle's election.

The official "dry" organization is also another factor in the political hodge-podge and some interesting developments are expected in this campaign. There is little prospect, however, that the Liberals or the "drys" or even Mr. Nickle will take any action until there is a Government supporter in the field.

When seen by a newspaper representative following the Conservative convention, Mr. T. A. Kidd, whose name was mentioned in the convention as a likely Conservative candidate, did not care to make any statement, but he threw out a pretty broad hint that he would be a contender for the nomination when the convention was held.
