**May Be a Candidate.**

The Kingston Sea Cadet Corps held a very enjoyable Halloween "social evening" Wednesday night. The boys turned out for this event in the usual strength. Music for the dance was supplied by Sid Salebury, and his orchestra.

**Fine Crowd at Dance.**  
A large crowd attended the opening dance in the Orange Hall, Portsmouth on Wednesday evening. Excellent music was supplied by the Twilight Ramblers Orchestra. It was generous in response to the applause for encores.

**Died at Watertown, N.Y.**  
Mrs. F. B. Signor, Watertown, N.Y., died on Sunday after a brief illness. She was born at Portland, Ont., on July 11th, 1859, a daughter of the late Isaac Miller. Three weeks ago, a week apart, a brother and sister also passed away at Three Mile Bay, N.Y.

**Engagement Announced.**

**Wear a Poppy "In Remembrance."**  
Poppies will be worn on Nov. 11th, the anniversary of Armistice Day, by thousands of people all over the British Empire. Poppies will be sold in Kingston on Saturday of this week by the Kingston branch of the Canadian Legion, while wreaths may be ordered from the Legion Headquarters at any time.

**Sideswiped a Car.**  
A large car from Kingston, with two men and two women in it, struck a car near Massena, N.Y., on the left side, throwing it off the road into the ditch where it turned completely over several times. The two youths in it escaped serious injury by a miracle. The Kingston car proceeded on its way without stopping.

**A Fine Window Display.**  
The window display of Samuel Hamilton, hardware dealer, has attracted considerable attention for poppy day. In the window is a highland soldier in field outfit with service rifle. There is also a wonderful collection of medals and war souvenirs. The display is very appropriate for the annual Armistice Day memorial.

**Alms of Kingston's First Theatre.**  
Rev. A. P. Addison, D.D., Toronto, before the York Pioneer's Historical Society and reading from the editorial page of the Christian Guardian, described the establishment of the first theatre in Kingston, the proceeds from which were to be distributed among the ministers for relief work. A few of these

ministers had been thankful for such donations, but the majority had rejected what Dr. Ryerson designated as "ill-gotten gains."

**Ladies' Gymnasium Class.**  
The ladies' gymnasium class of the Y.M.C.A. held a supper Wednesday night and elected the following officers: President, Miss J. E. Fletcher; vice-president, Miss Mauda Sinclair; secretary-treasurer, Miss M. Allen; social convener, Miss W. Rogers; entertainment convener, Miss M. Davy. The class is now putting on a membership drive and the numbers are mounting to the desired height.

**Portsmouth Boy Scouts.**  
The Boy Scouts of the first Portsmouth troop at their regular meeting Wednesday night, were treated to a special bit of fun. It was a grand reminder of the camp. The boys had a "gather-round-the-camp-fire" sing-song, the kind that all had enjoyed at the summer camp. The assistant scoutmaster of the first Kingston troop was in attendance and helped the meeting along. Another new Scout was invited into the organization and will now be able to join in all the work which the troop is doing.

**Wins Scholarship.**  
The will of the late J. I. Carter, of Sarnia, provided for the award in each of twenty-five counties of Ontario, of three scholarships, subject to certain conditions, to the candidates ranking first, second and third in ten papers of the Upper School examinations each year. The first scholarship is for one hundred dollars, the second for sixty dollars and the third for forty dollars. At the examinations of June last, Kenneth Hall, of the Athens High School, won the first Carter scholarship for the united counties of Leeds and Grenville.

**Eastern Ontario Women's Institutes.**  
The Women's Institutes of Eastern Ontario, in session at the Chateau Laurier, Ottawa, at which are represented the Institutes in the five districts from which The Whig receives reports, heard an address from Miss M. L. MacGulgan, Elgin, who gave the report of the committee on historical research and national history. Miss MacGulgan said that history taught at the present time was more interesting than that in schools a quarter of a century ago. It still lacked, however, details of how people of another century lived and thought. "What we want to know is how our ancestors lived and what they thought about," Miss MacGulgan said. To preserve antiques and valuable relics, it was suggested that to preserve the records of villages and towns a historian or archivist be appointed from the Institutes to do this valuable work. It was the Women's Institutes' task to collect articles of historical interest and to show the seeds of interest for the establishment of county museums. The speaker cited the Maidland Institute as having taken a step forward in this project when it placed markings and flags on the sites of the first white settlers in Leeds and Grenville.

### NEW BROKERAGE OFFICE OPENED IN MONTREAL

**James Richardson & Sons Operates Broadcasting Station at Moose Jaw.**

James Richardson and Sons, Limited, with extensive wire connections throughout Canada, following their acquisition of a seat on the Montreal Stock Exchange, have opened an office in the Board of Trade Building, Montreal, with all facilities for conducting a stock exchange, as well as a grain brokerage business.

It also operates a broadcasting station in conjunction with its Moose Jaw office, known as CJRM, through which grain and stock quotations, weather reports, financial news and reports of current events are broadcast every day to all sections of western Canada.

The service, which has been in operation for some time, has proved to be so popular that arrangements have been completed to greatly enlarge the scope of the broadcasting, with a view of reaching a very much larger territory.

The stock exchange office in Montreal is in charge of H. W. Nelles, formerly of Kingston. He was formerly a member of the Financial Post organization in Toronto and for years has served with James Richardson and Sons in their grain and other departments.

### BOY MOTHERED BY MARIE.

**Curious Lad Had Become Marooned on Royal Train.**

Spokane, Wash., Nov. 4.—A small boy may look at a queen and be carried away from his home for it. Lester Brown, aged ten, was found aboard Queen Marie's special train a few minutes after it had left Sandpoint, Idaho, yesterday. He was in tears. He had slipped aboard the train as it slowed down for Sandpoint and had been unable to hop off as it passed the station because of the press of the crowd.

Queenly arms comforted him and the royal candy was brought into play. He was the Queen's guest until Spokane was reached. Marie herself telegraphed the boy's parents. After playing bean bag with Prince Nicolas and Princess Helene, Lester dined with the royal family.

### Open Gold Mines.

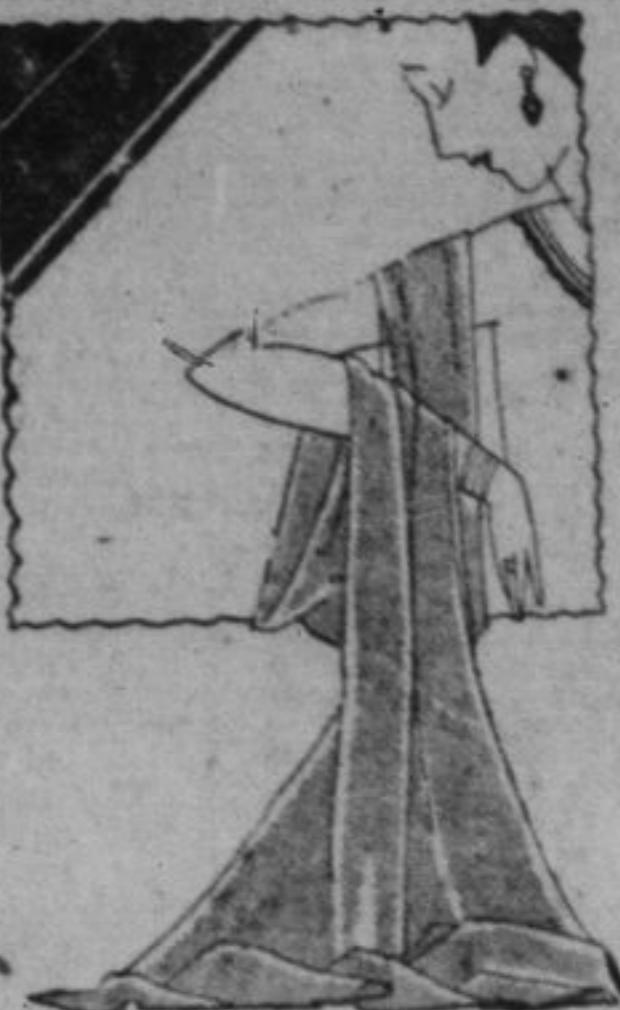
