The team left to-day at noon for Montreal in a special coach on No. 14, accompanied by a great many supporters.

It is estimated that the largest Kingston delegation to Montreal for a football game will see Queen's and McGill do battle tomorrow.

ANOTHER RUGBY RIOT IN STATES

One Man Fatally Injured—Star Spangled Banner Stopped the Riot.

Houston, Texas, Nov. 4.—Playing of the Star Spangled Banner by the band of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College which brought the cadet students of the school to attention ended a clash of Aggie and Baylor University students between periods of a football game at Waco, Texas, but not until Charles M. Sesums, of Dallas, had been injured fatally Saturday, witnesses said.

Sesums, at first thought to have been slightly injured, died Sunday of a fractured skull.

An account of the affray as related by Miss Esther Didsun, who attended the game, was that a truck loaded with Baylor girl students was driven to the Aggie side of the grounds. An Aggie student jumped on it. One girl tumbled off as he landed on the truck.

ST. LOUIS CARDINALS FIGURE IN BIG SPLIT

Rogers Hornsby Demands Retirement of Branch Rickey and Rest of His Holdings.

Not only has Rogers Hornsby, manager of the world champion Cardinals, asked for a \$50,000 contract for the next three years, but also has demanded the retirement of Branch Rickey as vice-president and business manager of the club.

On top of this comes a story that when Rickey advised Bredon a few weeks ago to pay \$50,000 to the Syracuse club for a certain outfielder. Hornsby bobbed up with a promise to get a better man from another minor league club for one-fifth that amount.

Hornsby's objection to the proposed \$50,000 transaction is believed to have blocked a plan to get the Syracuse club out of a financial bog. There seems to be so much trouble in the St. Louis club, supposed to be due to the difference between Hornsby and Bredon, that baseball men are beginning to take stock in the yarn that Hornsby will be the Giants' second baseman next year and that Frankie Frisch will fill that important position in the world champions' infield.

Cobb's Successor Has Had Great Experience

Minneapolis, Nov. 5.—George Moriarity, American League umpire, appointed to succeed the fiery Ty Cobb as manager of the Detroit American League club, has had managerial aspirations for several years.

Having served as an American League umpire for ten years, Moriarity is rated by critics as being well qualified for a manager's job. He is a recognized authority on the national pastime and has written baseball for news syndicates and magazines.

Moriarity broke into professional baseball in 1904, when he was picked up from the sand lots at Woodstock, Ill., by Frank Sell, manager of the Chicago Cubs.
