Six Months for Contempt.
Toronto, Nov. 5.—Harry Sculthorp, seedsman, Port Hope, was found guilty of contempt of court and committed to the common jail for six months. The period of imprisonment will be shortened to three months upon payment of plaintiff's costs, fixed at \$100.
