AT THE CAPITOL.
"The Flaming Frontier," the Universal Production now the attraction at the Capitol Theatre, is a picture play that in addition to commemorating a great event in American history abounds in excellent acting in a story featured with a pretty romance side-splitting comedy and situations that are as tremendous and thrilling as they are unusual. Once again the main subject of conversation on the topic of theatricals in Canada is the Dumbells and their newest show, "Joy Bombs." If we did not have this clever organization to rely on at least once a year the dearth of really first class shows would be felt more keenly than it is. There are three complete units in the first act, plus four or five splendid individual efforts. The pre-war military sketch is a laugh from start to finish. The "Three for Tea" satire is a sparkling gem in a Tiffany setting. Al Plunkett, Stan Bennett and Pat Harrington, a newcomer, score heavily in this. Then, there is that wonderful Coster scene, with its bits of comedy and tragedy—its songs and dances and its ten thousand post buttons glistening in the lights. "Jock" Holland, Pat Rafferty, Stan Bennett and "Red" Newman are the centre of attraction in making this scene one of the highlights of all the Dumbells' revues. HAD ARM "FROZEN" FOR SECOND BOUT

Calgary, Nov. 6.—Because of an injury to his right arm, sustained while training for his bout with Leo ("Kid") Roy, at Montreal, Yle Foley, Vancouver feather-weight, will be unable to fulfill his ten-round engagement against "Young" Cowie, Alberta champion, here on Nov. 10.

Upon arrival here today Foley was examined by a physician, and it was found that a tendon of the right arm had been badly wrenched. Jack Allen, Foley's manager, says the injury happened prior to Foley's first bout with Roy and that it was necessary to have the arm frozen for the second bout. "At that, Foley was frightened to put any force behind his blows, and Roy had him at a disadvantage," says Allen.

FERGUSON'S PLEA FOR SANE THINKING

Wants to Put All Ontario Liquor into One Channel of Supply.

Shelburne, Nov. 6.—Premier Ferguson carried his plea for "sane thinking" on the liquor question into Dufferin yesterday. "All I am pleading for," he told the Conservative convention here, "is controlled distribution of liquor instead of uncontrolled. What I want is to put all this liquor—loose and otherwise—into one channel of supply, put a sentry over it, and be able to say that whoever dips into it will be known to us."

Princess Was in Tears.
Malmoe, Sweden, Nov. 6.—Almost alone on the deck of the Swedish cruiser Fylgia, Princess Astrid vainly tried to hide the tears that came as the warship steamed out of the harbor here to take her to Belgium where she will join her husband, Crown Prince Leopold. There were also tears of joy over the warmth of the farewells of the great crowd that had gathered to see her depart. The royal couple were married at Stockholm on Thursday then separated, and will go through another ceremony in Belgium.

The Family Market Basket

The local market prices early on Saturday morning soared, but suddenly took a drop. Eggs were offered at first at 75c a dozen, but later dropped to 60c. Chickens were offered at \$2.50 a pair and dropped to \$1.75. Potatoes, too, have been rather high, but this morning they were selling as low as \$2 a bag.
