J. K. HACKETT NOTED ACTOR DIES IN PARIS

Born on Wolfe Island, Opposite Kingston, in 1869.

SHAKESPEARE PLAYER

Was to Have Appeared To-day Before King George and Queen Mary.

Paris, Nov. 9.—James K. Hackett died in Paris yesterday morning. The noted actor had been staying at the Hotel Maurice since September, when he came to Paris to consult French specialists on liver trouble from which he had been ailing for several months...

The famous Shakespearean player was a well-known figure in Paris, where he had enjoyed the unique distinction of appearing by special request from the French Government in the state-subsidized Odeon Theatre and being decorated with the Legion of Honor after the performance of Othello during the Molieres Tercentenary Festival in Paris...

Shock to London. London, Nov. 9.—The death of James K. Hackett, noted actor, in Paris came as a shock to theatre-goers, hundreds of whom have been looking forward to seeing him act in a scene from Macbeth before the King and Queen at Drury Lane Theatre this afternoon...

Favorite of Fortune.

The lap of fortune was piled high with lavish gifts for James K. Hackett, who at the age of 24 was the youngest leading man on the American stage...

Mr. Hackett's most notable early successes were "The Prisoner of Zenda" and its sequel, "Rupert of Hentzau," and "The Prides of Jenico" in the late '90's, under the management of Daniel Frohman...

Born in Canada.

James K. Hackett was born on Wolfe Island, near Kingston, Ont., on September 6th, 1869; of American parents summering in Canada. His father, James H. Hackett, was a noted Shakespearean and classic actor of his generation...

FAMED SHRINE AT STE. ANNE AGAIN BURNED

Temporary Basilica and Most of Contents Destroyed.

HALF MILLION LOSS

Relic of the Saint Spared, but the Venerable Bell and Statue Were Lost.

Quebec, Nov. 9.—Ste. Anne de Beaupre, the "Holy City" of North America, was visited early yesterday by the worst calamity which has befallen it when fire completely destroyed the temporary Basilica...

Firemen and fire apparatus were rushed from this city in an effort to save the Basilica at Ste. Anne de Beaupre but while unable to prevent the destruction of the church they succeeded in controlling the spread of the flames...

Before noon an army of searchers among the debris of the burned temporary Basilica made the discovery that the relics, which were believed to have been destroyed in the fire were actually saved. They were in the vault in the sacristy...

Half a million dollars is the material loss sustained by the Order of the Redemptorist Fathers, guardians of the shrine of Ste. Anne. There were no casualties, although a panic in the nearby hospital, in which were a number of patients, was averted by the nurses and attendants...

MOON IS SENTENCED TO SECOND LIFE TERM

A Verdict of Manslaughter is Returned by the Jury at Belleville.

Belleville, Nov. 9.—Found "not guilty of murder, but guilty of manslaughter," David Arthur Moon, charged with the shooting of Clayton McWilliams in a drug store here on the night of April 6th, 1925, was sentenced to life imprisonment in Portmuth penitentiary by Justice Mowat late on Saturday afternoon...

OVER FASCIST ATTACK

On French Consulate--Jugo-Slavia Minister Alleged to Have Called Mussolini a Fool.

Paris, Nov. 9.—Premier Mussolini of Italy has presented his regrets to the French ambassador in Rome for the recent incident at Ventimiglia, in which the French consulate was reported attacked by Fascists...

Mussolini told Ambassador Bernard that he had ordered the authorities at Ventimiglia to set judicial machinery in motion and speed up the trial of a man named Cauvin and others who might be responsible for the attack on the consulate...

Meanwhile the French state police are busily engaged in studying documents found among the possessions of Ricotti Garibaldi, who was brought here last week from Nice to be questioned about his activities in connection with a plot to invade Catalonia...

Has Not Declared For Government Liquor Control

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PROGRESS OF PARLEYS

The Government, on its side, is anxious to secure a negotiated settlement, thus obviating recourse to the establishment of an Appeal Board by legislation. TO WIPE OUT PUBLIC DEBT, Claims Premier Ferguson

Merrickville, Nov. 9.—Premier G. Howard Ferguson, speaking at a Conservative gathering here last evening, outlined the financial situation of the Province, and promised that in 40 years the huge debt of the Province, amounting to \$325,000,000, would be cleared, and the interest wiped out. He stated that when his Government went into power three years ago it was faced with a large debt. Since then, "after getting rid of a lot of expensive people, we have got matters to a normal surface," he said...
