PREMIER ASKS AN EMPHATIC VOTE DEC. 1

Thinks It Will Settle Liquor Question for Twenty Years.

ADDRESS AT PICTON

Hon. Howard Ferguson Claims That His Statistics on the O.T.A. Are Incontrovertible.

Pictou, Nov. 19.—Premier Ferguson last night expressed the firm belief that the vote on Dec. 1 would settle the liquor question for 20 years. "It behooves you," he told his great audience of Prince Edward County electors, "to settle that question properly. It doesn't matter whether the government stays in power or whether I remain Prime Minister or not, I want an emphatic pronouncement on this question from the great mass of people. And whether it comes from one side or the other, I'm certain that the people will be right, whether I am or not. Same thought on the question is all I ask. Then the great sum total of the Province of Ontario will solve this question in the right way."

He Would Expel Girls Who Attend Dances Unchaperoned

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—In commenting upon school girls attending dances, Justice Orde, who is holding an investigation into the Ottawa Collegiate affairs, said: "I wouldn't allow a girl of school age to go to a dance hall unless accompanied by her mother or someone who could be trusted to look after her. I wouldn't say even her own brother. There is too much danger associated with dance-halls to imperil young girls. So far as responsibility of the school board is concerned, I would make expulsion from school the penalty for attending such dances as have been described."

NEW YORK STATE COMMISSION GREATLY IMPRESSED WITH PORTSMOUTH PENITENTIARY

Better Managed Than American Prisons--Sanitary Sleeping Accommodation Fine--Visitors Remark on High Type of Men at Head of Canada's Penal Institutions--Declare Crime System is More Effective in Canada.

The New York State Crime Commission, which visited the Portsmouth Penitentiary this morning, were greatly impressed with the order in which everything is carried out. The convicts are managed in an entirely better manner than those in American prisons and they found that the Canadian system of management could be adapted to their prisons and thus improve them.

with any of the penal institutions of the United States, although it was considerably smaller than Sing Sing. "Our reason for coming over here was because your system seemed to be much more effective than ours," Mr. Smith continued. MAYOR ANGROVE ALL SET FOR THE BATTLE

Will Run as Independent Candidate in Favor of the "Wet Policy."

All smiles and ready for the battle, Mayor Thomas Angrove was found in his office at the city-hall today, all set for the coming contest for the Ontario Legislature. "I am running in this campaign as an independent candidate," Mayor Angrove stated, when interviewed by a representative of The British Whig. "I was at the Conservative convention held last night, but I refused to allow my name to go before the convention."

Sanitation Fine.

The sanitary sleeping accommodation of the Portsmouth institution was another thing which the commission especially noted. This they said was exceptionally fine. The method of exercising the prisoners in the Portsmouth penitentiary differs greatly from the system in use in the New York institutions. Here the gangs are taken from each department separately and given exercise, but in the institutions across the line the men are put to work in the shops and are left there throughout the day, sports being their only exercise.

The Commission.

The commission which includes beside the chairman, Senator Caleb H. Baumes, Newburgh, Senators John Knight and B. Roger Wales; and Assemblymen Joseph A. McGinnies, Burton D. Edmond and Walter Gedney; Col. George Fletcher Chandler, former head of New York State Police; Thomas S. Rice, Brooklyn; David S. Taylor, Buffalo; and Jane M. Hoey, New York, was escorted through the penitentiary by Brig-General W. S. Hughes, superintendent of prisons, and Deputy-Warden Tucker. The party left the Frontenac Hotel shortly after 9 o'clock for the prison and spent the entire morning studying the preventive and curative methods used by the Dominion Government in dealing with law-breakers.

High Type of Officials.

"You seem to have a very high type of men at the head of your institutions here," said Mr. Herbert L. Smith, secretary of the commission. The mail bag contract at Portsmouth was commented on by Mr. Smith, who felt that it was an excellent thing that the prison labor could be turned to some good account. Portsmouth compared very favorably with the members of the commission marveled at the fact that the officials can dispose of prison products so easily here. In their prisons the products cannot be sold due to the objection made by labor unions. The prisoners make only the necessities of the institution and cannot dispose of any products outside of the prison.

13 CHILDREN WERE KILLED

When Terrible Gale Wrecked School House--Disaster at La Plata, Md.

La Plata, Maryland, Nov. 10.—A driving wind struck suddenly out of a sultry sky yesterday and shattered a schoolhouse here in which about 50 children were studying. Eleven perished in the ruins and two others died while being rushed to Washington for treatment. At least 20 more were injured, some critically. A negro man and woman were killed in their dwelling, one of three caught in the narrow mile-long path of the storm.

up the little knoll on which the schoolhouse stood. Injured children lay in the twisted wreckage, which was strewn over a wide circle. Other children were running about dazed and crying for help. Some had been carried by the wind several hundred feet; others had fled, stumbling and weeping.
