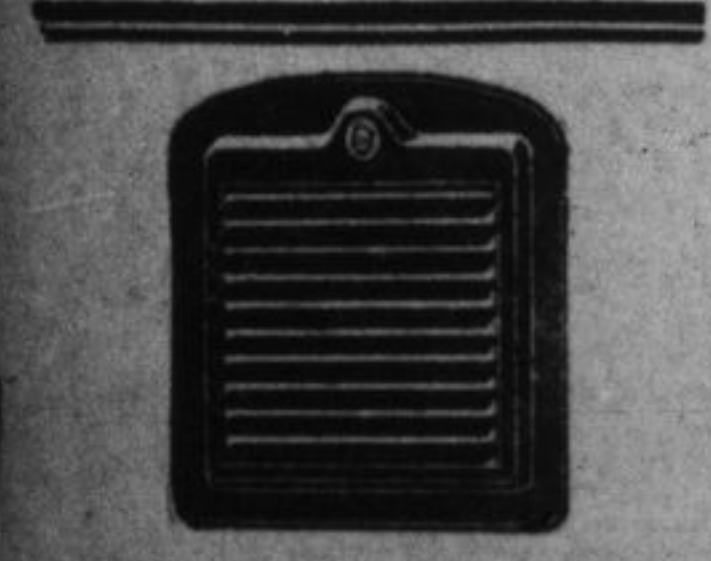

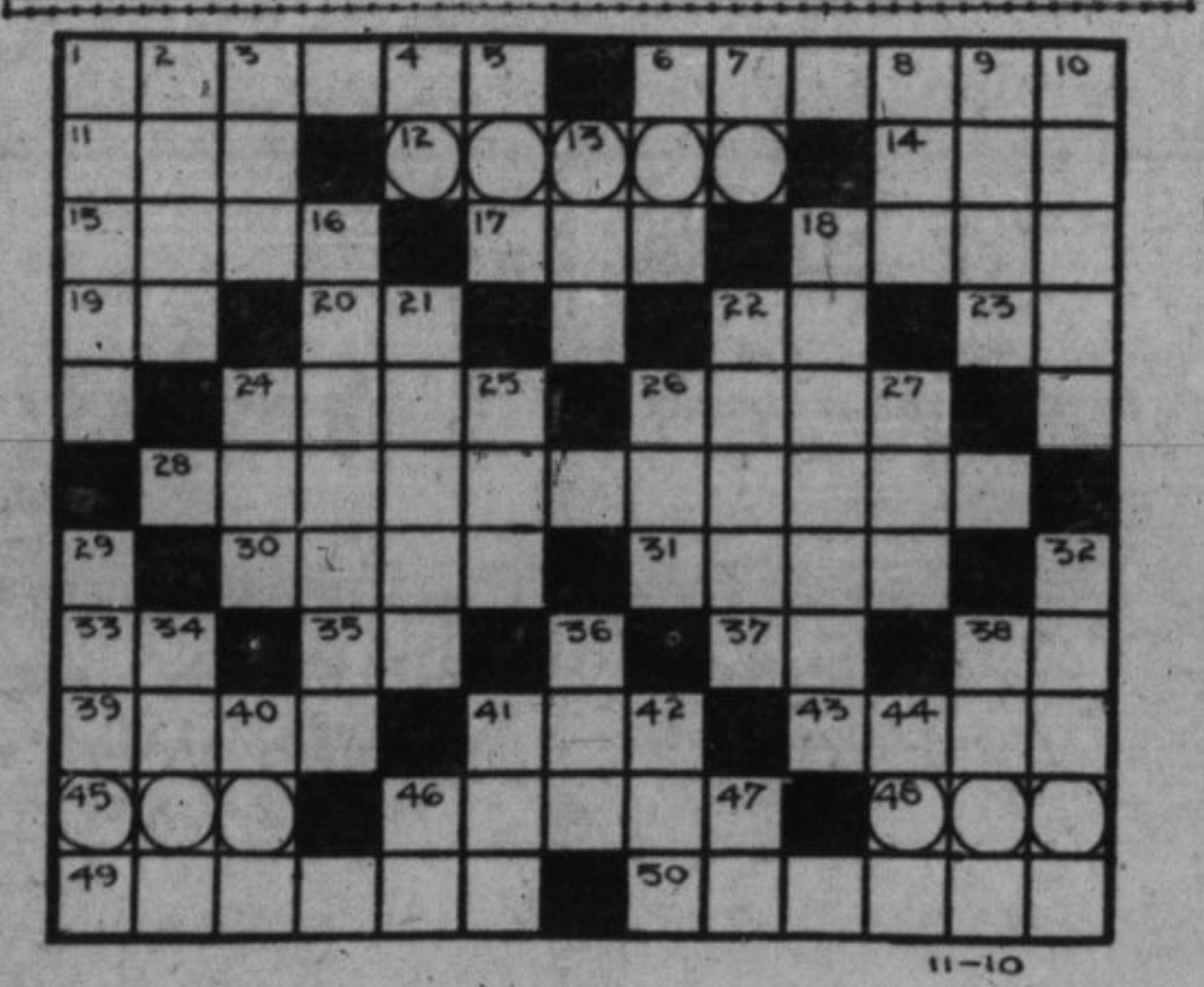

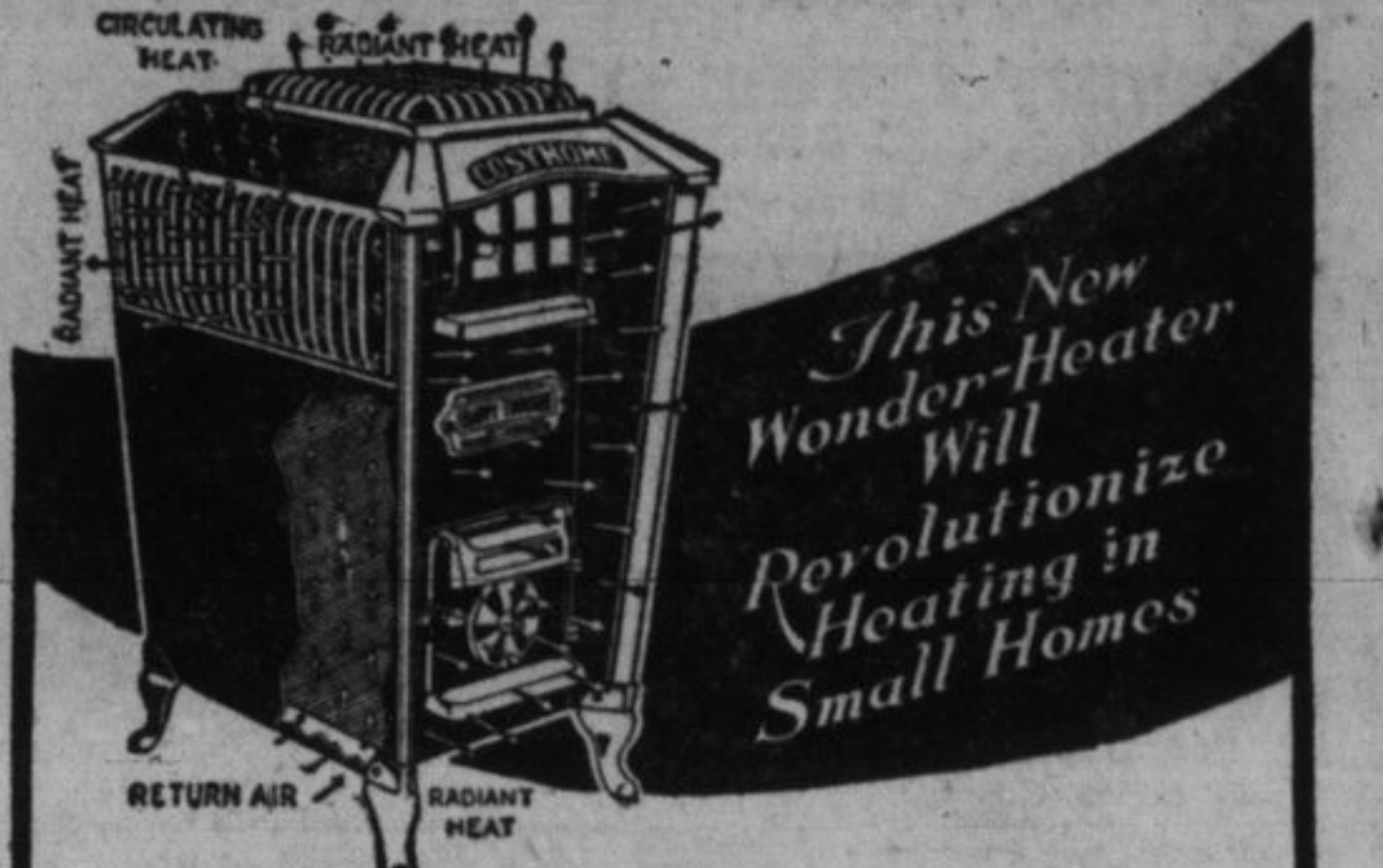

Butcher steers, medium, \$5.50 to \$6; common, \$4.50 to \$5.50; butcher heifers, good, \$5.75; medium, \$5.25 to \$5.50; common, \$3.50 to \$4.75; butcher cows, good, \$4.75 to \$5.25; medium, \$3.30 to \$5.50; canners, \$1.50 to \$1.75; cutters, \$2.50 to \$2.75; butcher bulls, common, \$3 to \$3.50. There were no top quality calves. Four of the best were picked out at \$11.50, but the balance of the suckers brought from \$9.75 to \$11.10; grassers \$3.75 to \$4.10; bulk of sales \$4. Good veal, \$11 to \$11.50; medium, \$9.75 to \$10; common, \$4.70 to \$5; grasses, \$4.50 to \$5. Common and medium lambs brought from \$10 to \$11; bulk, and a few common and very ordinary lambs were sold flat at \$10.25, and culls out at \$9. Sheep, \$3 to \$5.75. Quotations: Ewes, \$3 to \$5.75; lambs, good, \$11.50; common, \$10 to \$11; bucks, \$9 to \$10. Hogs, thick smooths, \$11.75; select \$2 per head, premium and lights \$11.25 to \$11.50. Sows, \$9.25 to \$9.50.
