The induction of Harold Arnold Kent, M.A., D.D., as principal of Queen's Theological College, was carried out on Wednesday afternoon with fitting ceremonies and before representatives of the General Council of the United Church of Canada, the Bay of Quinte Conference, the Presbytery of Kingston, the Board of the Theological College, and Queen's University. The service was held in Convocation Hall and was conducted by Rev. R. M. Hamilton, of Brockville, as chaplin, and Rev. G. A. Brown, president of the Bay of Quinte Conference. Dr. R. B. Taylor, principal of Queen's University, publicly presented Dr. Kent and Dr. George Pidgeon conveyed the best wishes of the United Church to both the principal and the college.

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
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
