THE INDUCTION OF THEOLOGY PRINCIPAL

Rev. Dr. H. A. Kent Was Installed on Wednesday Afternoon.

The induction of Harold Arnold Kent, M.A., D.D., as principal of Queen's Theological College, was carried out on Wednesday afternoon with fitting ceremonies and before representatives of the General Council of the United Church of Canada, the Day of Quinze Conference, the Presbytery of Kingston, the Board of the Theological College, and Queen's University. The service was held in Convocation Hall and was conducted by Rev. R. M. Hamilton, of Brockville, as chaplain, and Rev. G. A. Brown, president of the Day of Quinze Conference. Dr. R. B. Taylor, principal of Queen's University, publicly presented Dr. Kent and Dr. George Pidgeon conveyed the best wishes of the United Church to both the principal and the college.

Theology First Course. Following the devotional part of the service Dr. Taylor spoke. "Queen's had its origin," he said, "in a desire to train on Canadian soil Canadian young men for the Presbyterian Church in Canada." Before Queen's was established young Canadians entering the ministry of the Presbyterian church were forced to go to Scotland to get their training. Principal Grant and Principal Gordon had both taken their university courses there. Theology had in the early days been the most important course and arts had been secondary.

In eighty-five years the college had grown to a university, the speaker said, with medicine and science ranged alongside theology and arts. In 1912 the theological college had been officially separated from Queen's University but there had been no actual break. The students of theology were accepted by the university students as a part of themselves and the professors on the college staff were considered as brothers by the professors of the university staff.

Principal Kent's Career.

It had been no easy matter to find a capable successor for Principal Dyde but at last the choice had fallen on Harold Arnold Kent formerly professor of Old Testament literature at Pine Hill College, N.S. Dr. Kent was a native of Nova Scotia and a graduate of Dalhousie University. He graduated in arts in 1901 and for a year taught school at Trinidad in the West Indies. Then he entered Pine Hill and completed his theological course in 1905. For a year he served a country parish and then won a scholarship which entitled him to tuition in Germany. In 1908 he became assistant professor in Old Testament literature at Pine Hill and in 1910 became a full professor which position he filled at the time he was chosen to become principal of Queen's Theological College. Dr. Kent served overseas as a company officer and was later transferred to the chaplain service. On behalf of the University Dr. Taylor assured his auditors that Queen's was deeply interested in the welfare of the college and that whatever affected the college also touched the university.

Authority and Freedom.

Following the actual induction ceremony Principal Kent spoke on "Authority and Freedom in Religion." In the course of his address the speaker showed that there has always been a desire on the part of some people for an infallible authority in religion and a desire on the part of other people to exercise that authority. Another faction had fought against this temporal authority preferring the authority of their own consciences. The laws of the Jews had been set up as the first infallible authority but certain men such as St. Paul found no real satisfaction in carrying out these laws but through the example of Christ they had found an unknown freedom. Christianity had made rapid headway among the slaves of the pagan nations also because it granted them a sense of freedom. In the second or third century however the church began to show an outward authority. When the church had tried to use force to improve it had brought about the world it had brought about the Protestant Reformation. In the seventeenth century the Protestants had tried to set up the infallible authority of the scriptures and the doctrine of the literal and mechanical inspiration of the scriptures was born.

No Authority Infallible.

Reasonable Christians would admit some authority both to the church and the Bible, the speaker said, but the real authority was an inward consciousness of God. "There is many an old lady who sits by the fire with her knitting who knows more of the authority of God than the greatest scholar in the land," he declared. The speaker urged his listeners to accept no authority as infallible but to wrestle with the problems that confronted them and in so doing become stronger men. In concluding Principal Kent referred to Principal Snodgrass and Principal Grant of Queen's, both of whom had done much for Dalhousie University and Queen's. He said that he would always keep them as shining examples before him although he must follow them afar off. "The church can have no greater task or trust than the training of its ministers," said Rev. Dr. George Pidgeon, former Moderator of the General Council of the United
