Snyder was not as effective as he might have been. The outstanding play for Varsity was made by Trimble whose 55 yard sprint was one of the most threatening things that Varsity did. The Blue and White are not disgraced in their defeat and when they go to Montreal next Saturday they will be favorites to defeat McGill. Varsity's team is powerful and it is to be much reckoned with. Queen's will have a real battle again on their hands in Toronto should they meet Varsity there. Local sympathy is largely with McGill in next Saturday's game but fears are that Varsity will defeat the Shagmen.

PLENTY OF COLOR.

While Saturday's game was bitterly-fought and most sensational, the other points that go to make up an intercollegiate contest were not lacking. The game was attended by over 9,000 wildly excited fans and enthusiasts from far and near were there. Varsity brought down a strong contingent including the very fine band which created a very favorable impression here. There

was college atmosphere for the great game and the yells, singing, bands playing, etc., all helped to make it an occasion that will not soon be lost on those who were present for it. The only regret is that Kingston will not have another like it this season as the next two games are in Montreal and Toronto, Kingston being passed up in the final playoffs.

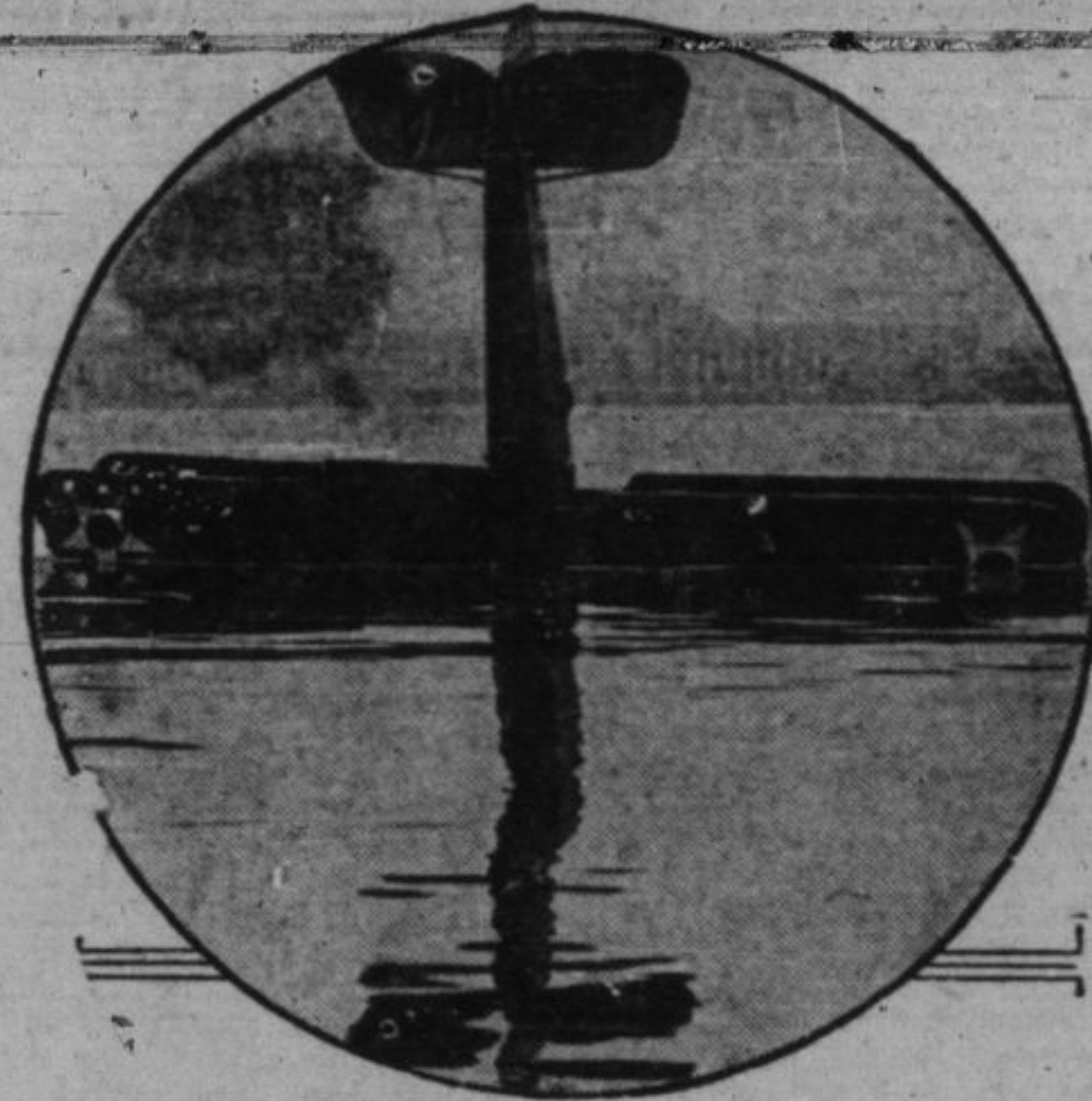

Varsity Wins Harrier Meet

The R.M.C. and Queen's Runners Took Second and Third Places.

The Intercollegiate Harrier meet over a six-mile course in which McGill, R.M.C., University of Toronto and Queen's took part Saturday morning resulted in a win for Varsity. The course was rather difficult especially the half-mile of field work. R. M. Mitchell of Toronto went in first making the six miles in 29 minutes and 1 second. Behind Mitchell was Tremouth of Queen's, who made the course in very good time.

The teams and their rating of coming in, were as follows: McGill—Rubin 5, Balmer 13, Brodie 20, Calhoun 18, Le Boutillier 11. Toronto—Graham 3, Mitchell, R. M., 1, Mitchell, W. 4, Baldwin 14, Crozier 8. R.M.C.—Smith, R. 7, Groves 9, Smith, M., 19, Price 12, Rodgers 10. Queen's—Tremouth 2, Tvedell 6, Moore 16, Revelle 17, Thompson 15. The score won by the different teams are as follows: McGill 47 points, Toronto 16 points, R.M.C. 38 points, Queen's 39 points. The lowest score is that registered by Varsity, thereby winning the meet. R.M.C. came second with thirty-eight points, just defeating Queen's by one point. This is a repetition of last year when the cadets were just one point ahead of the Queen's team.

R.M.C. Team in The Playoffs

Defeated Loyola Again and Took Round by 15-13 Score.

Montreal, Nov. 15.—Royal Military College intermediates disposed of Loyola College by defeating the local team here on Saturday by the score of 8-7, winning the round by 15-13 by virtue of their win at Kingston last Wednesday by the score of 7-6. Conditions could not have been worse for the game. The gridiron was covered with two inches of snow and was in a terrible slippery condition.

The victory on Saturday gave R.M.C. the Eastern intercollegiate championship and they will now meet the western winners. About 2,000 people attended Saturday's game.

Tremaine of R.M.C. was the outstanding player of the game and scored all the R.M.C. points, his booting being particularly effective throughout the play.

First Period.

The Cadets broke into Loyola territory soon after the start. Tremaine booted a long one from Loyola's 40 yard line and when the home halves were slow to field the hoist Tremaine tore through to gain possession of his own kick. It was smart work. Tremaine then kicked over the line where Bannon was downed for a rouse. R.M.C. 1, Loyola 0.

A kick from midfield gave R.M.C. possession on their 20. Tremaine booted and Tynan was downed on his 40. Smith went through for yards on the second down. Savard booted to R.M.C. 30 and ran through to retain possession. It was a duplication of Tremaine's play at the start. On the first play Smith tried an onside kick but Tremaine caught the ball and was downed behind the line to tie the score. R.M.C. 1, Loyola 1.

Molson broke through for a long run for the Cadets, and it brought the play to Loyola's 30. Tremaine kicked, and Tynan ran the ball out from behind. After an exchange of kicks between Tremaine and Savard R.M.C. were in possession on Loyola's 30 at quarter time.

First quarter—R.M.C. 1, Loyola 1.

Second Quarter.

When play was resumed the Cadets tried two bucks and failed, and then Tremaine booted over and a Loyola half was "snowed" behind for another point. R.M.C. 2, Loyola 1.

When Pirie, Cadet half, fumbled Savard's punt, when play was resumed, Q. McCarrey fell on it, and Loyola secured at midfield.

Savard kicked on the first down, and the home wings were well down on the R.M.C. half who took the punt. R.M.C. worked the ball to midfield, and then Tremaine kicked to Bannon on Loyola's 40.

Savard booted once more, and the play was on R.M.C. 40. Tremaine kicked, and Savard fumbled the high punt to give the visitors possession well in Loyola territory. On another punt the Cadets gained 20 yards when the ball bounded back and an onside player secured. From his 30 yard line Tremaine kicked over, and Cummins was downed when he made a good effort to run it out. It was another point for the visitors. R.M.C. 3, Loyola 1.

At half-time the Cadets were leading in the game 3-1 and on the round 4-1.

Third Quarter.

After an exchange of kicks in the third quarter soon after the ball got into action Loyola worked their way to R.M.C.'s 30 yard line. The first down failed and then on a run around the end Tynan tore over the line for a touchdown, giving the Loyola team a long lead. It was a run of over 30 yards. The try was converted by Savard. Loyola 7, R.M.C. 2.

When play was resumed R.M.C. got a break and held on Loyola's 25 yard line. Tremaine booted far over the line and a Loyola half was downed for a rouse. Loyola 7, R.M.C. 4. R.M.C. got another rouse when Tremaine ran around the end of the 20 yards and then kicked over. Loyola 7, R.M.C. 5.

When the third quarter ended Loyola was leading in the game by 7-5.

Fourth Quarter.

With R.M.C. holding on Loyola's 10 yard line at the start of the last period Tremaine attempted an onside kick. It failed, but went for a point when it bounded to the touch-line. Loyola 7, R.M.C. 6.

When Savard fumbled a punt on his own 30 yard line, R.M.C. secured, and Tremaine kicked for a point to tie the score and gain a point lead on the round.

Loyola 7, R.M.C. 7. R.M.C. gained another point on a kick by Tremaine when Loyola fumbled and the Kingstons secured on the home team's 20 yard line. R.M.C. 8, Loyola 7.

The game ended shortly after with R.M.C. hold a 2 point margin on the round.
