Result of District Voting Will Be Known Wednesday.

Ill---Government Will See that Miners Benefit.

London, Nov. 16 .- Acceptance of the Government's peace proposals by the striking miners is almost certain, although it probably will be Wednesday before the full results of the district voting are known. Als ready the legislative council of the South Wales Miners' Federation, controlling one of the biggest coal fields, has agreed to the terms.

Various other districts are busy deliberating and arranging to take votes. The South Wares numbering about 250,000 have been looked upon as the "die-hards," and now that they have given in, the likelihood is that other districts will

follow suit immediately. The settlement, although not so good as the miners might have obtained earlier in the stoppage, still holds valuable guarantees for them. It preserves the minimum wage and subsistence allowance, and if faithfully observed by the mine-owners will in a larger number of cases make certain the wages paid last April, provided the men work seven and a half or eight hours.

General Wage Standard. The Government proposals intended to maintain a sort of general standard of wages where the working-hours number more than seven and also to insure that miners shall benefit by prosperous conditions in the mining industry. It is reported that in the bill the Government is preparing for setting up of a national tribunal for six months there will clause providing that in the event of any mine-owner refusing to ac cept the ruling of the tribunal of the wages agreement in any dis-
