## KINGSTON NOT TO HAVE THREE-CORNERED ELECTION FIGHT

### Reported That Mayor Not To Be Candidate

#### Rumored That He Has Received Government Appointment—Battle Between Hon. W. F. Nickle and Ald. T. A. Kidd—Arrangements for the Nomination Speeches.

The British Whig is informed on good authority that Mayor Thomas Angrove will withdraw from the present election contest within twenty-four hours. It is now practically settled that his name will not be placed in nomination tomorrow.

It is rumored that the mayor has received an appointment from the Ferguson Government and will take up his new duties very shortly.

The retirement of the mayor leaves the field to the Hon. W. F. Nickle, the O.T.A. candidate, and Ald. T. A. Kidd, the government control candidate. This makes the issue clear, and the contest will be watched with interest all over Ontario.

#### Government Wants Healy to Remain

Dublin, Nov. 19.—Governor General Timothy Healy, owing to the censure of him in the Dail Eirean on Tuesday over a recent speech in which he is said to have asserted that the longer the British remained in the Dail, the better pleased he was, expressed a desire to resign. The Government, however, did not desire Mr. Healy to leave his post. Relations between the Governor and the Government remain friendly.

#### A Number Killed by Explosion on Boat

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 19.—An explosion with reported loss of life occurred to-day on the Norwegian coal tanker Manilla in drydock at Sparrow's point. First reports said from eight to twelve were killed. Fifty were injured.

Napanee, Nov. 19.—A gloom was cast over the town to-day when the news was spread of the death, during the night, of Mr. A. Macdonald, aged thirty-five years. He fell ill a short time afterwards and at 1 o'clock this morning he passed away. Mr. Macdonald had been a barber in Napanee for the past five years, coming here from Toronto. He conducted a shop on John street. He is survived by his wife and two children.
