

BY-LAW

to raise by way of loan the sum of \$25,000 by the issue of Debentures of the Municipality of the City of Kingston for the purpose of making certain alterations, improvements and repairs to the grounds and premises known as the Fair Grounds, in the City of Kingston.

1. The total amount of debt to be created is \$25,000.
2. The debentures shall bear interest at the rate of 5 per cent and shall be payable on the 1st day of July, 1937.
3. For the payment of this debt there shall be raised annually the sums of \$1,250 for interest and \$2,500 to form a sinking fund, these two making an amount of \$3,750, to be collected in each year for ten years by an annual special rate sufficient therefor.

Notice is hereby given that the foregoing is a true synopsis of a proposed By-law of the Corporation of the City of Kingston, which has been taken into consideration and which will be finally passed by the Council of the said Corporation in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereon after one month from the first publication thereof in The Daily British Whig newspaper, the date of which first publication will be on the 5th day of November, 1926.

The votes of the electors of the City of Kingston shall be taken on the proposed By-law on the same date as the annual Municipal election, at the same places and by the same Deputy Returning Officers.

On the 3rd day of December, 1926, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the Mayor's Office, the head of the Council of the said Corporation shall attend at said place in the said Municipality for the purpose of appointing and if requested so to do shall appoint by writing signed by him two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes of the electors and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the proposed By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the proposed By-law.

A tenant whose lease extends for the time for which the debt or liability is to be created or in which the money to be raised by the proposed By-law is payable, and who has by lease covenanted to pay all municipal taxes in respect of the property other than local improvement rates, if he makes and files with the Clerk not later than the tenth day before the day appointed for taking the vote a declaration under the Canada Evidence Act so stating shall be entitled to have his name entered on the list of voters prepared by the Clerk.

On the 7th day of December, 1926, at the hour of twelve o'clock noon, at the City Clerk's Office in the said Municipality, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the votes given for and against the proposed By-law.

BY-LAW

To grant a fixed assessment to McKelvey & Birch, Ltd., of the City of Kingston.

1. The assessment of the property of McKelvey & Birch, Ltd., including the land, buildings and business assessment, shall be fixed at One Thousand Dollars.

2. This fixed assessment shall not be for a longer period than ten years and shall not apply to or affect taxation for school purposes or local improvements.

3. The fixed assessment shall apply to the property of McKelvey & Birch, Ltd., a corporation carrying on and proposing to carry on within the Municipality of the City of Kingston certain manufacturing business and during only such period or part thereof as the property, including the land and premises hereinafter described are so used for manufacturing purposes, said property being described as that parcel or tract of land and premises situate, lying and being in the City of Kingston, in the County of Frontenac and being comprised of parts of farm lots 1 and 2 in the concession west of the Great Cataract River, in the Township of Kingston formerly, but now in the City of Kingston, and of the lots numbered 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 and 17 of registered Plan No. C.S. and of that part of Fraser street on said plan lying east of a line drawn as a street from the south-east corner of said lot 10, to the North-west corner of said lot 15, which line is hereby intended to be described may be more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the intersection of the west limit of Rideau Street, thirty-three feet north of the centre line of Russell Street, thence north westerly along the said west limit of Rideau Street, eight hundred and forty-two feet, to the intersection of the south side of Duff Street, as shown on a plan of lots laid out on said farm lot numbered 2 by T. W. Farnham, Registrar of Deeds, dated April 9th, 1887, and registered in the Office of the Registrar of Deeds of the City of Kingston on the 5th day of December, 1888, as plan "C. S." thence easterly along the said west limit of Rideau Street two hundred and eighty feet, six inches to the easterly limit of Montreal Street, thence north westerly along the easterly limit of Montreal Street two hundred and seventy-seven feet to the north-east corner of the lot shown on said plan "C. S." thence easterly along said north limit of Fraser Street one hundred and fifty feet to the boundary between the lots numbered ten and eleven thence south-easterly sixty-six feet to the point where the south limit of Fraser Street intersects the boundary between lots seventeen and eighteen, fronting on the south side of said street; thence southerly along said boundary one hundred and thirty-two feet to the rear of said lots; thence south easterly three hundred and forty-six feet more or less to intersect a line parallel to the centre line of Russell Street produced, and thirty-three feet north of said centre line; thence easterly three hundred feet along said line to the place of beginning.

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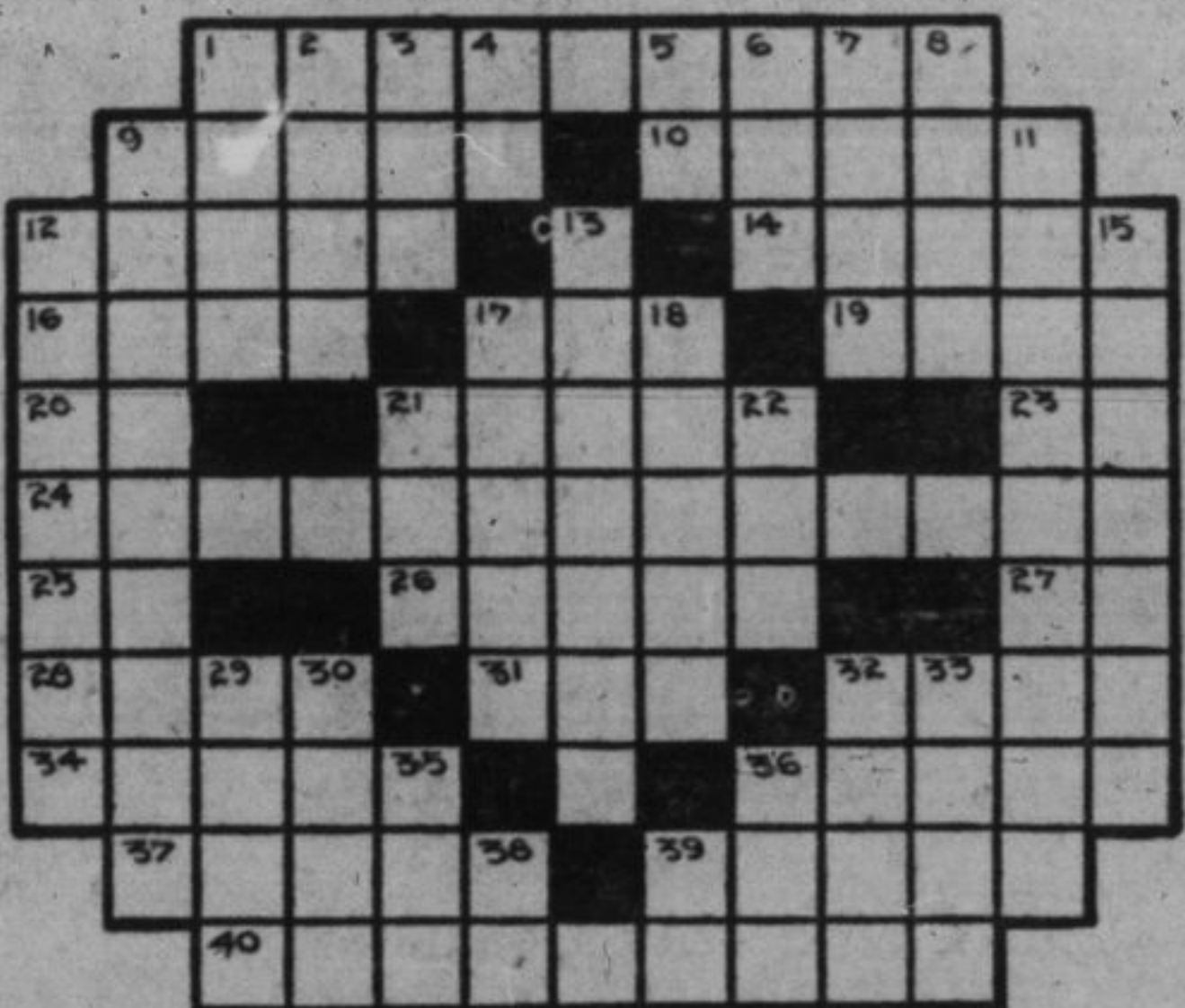
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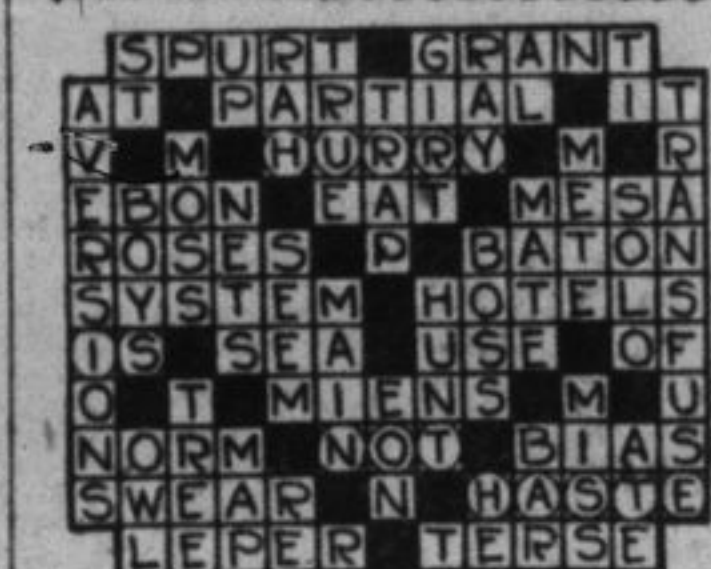
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CROSS-WORD PUZZLE
