TWO PLAYS GIVEN AT CONVOCATION HALL

Dramatic Guild, Held First Meeting of Season Thursday Night.

The Queen's Dramatic Guild held its first meeting of the season on Thursday night in Convocation Hall. The meetings are only open to members of the Guild, but there was a good attendance. Two one-act plays were presented, and one of these, entitled "In Love and War," was written by Mr. R. W. Cumberland, a member of the Guild. It is a romantic comedy, dealing with the war of 1812, and the scene is laid near Kingston. The play was directed by the author.

The second play was in one act, "How He Lied to Her Husband." It was laid in a South Kensington drawing-room, and the time was recent. At these meetings of the Dramatic Guild there is a minimum of business and a maximum of dramatic production and performance. Another such meeting is to be held next Thursday and it will be the final business meeting of the term.

Women Pledge Support to the Ontario Temperance Act.

On Thursday afternoon a number of ladies of the Kingston Presbyterian Executive went to Cataragui where a very successful rally was held in the United Church. Mrs. R. O. Jolliffe, President of the Presbyterian, presided. The following Auxiliaries were represented: Cataragui, Westbrooke, Glenvale, Kepler, Eiginburg. Mrs. Jolliffe showed a map of the district covered by the Kingston Presbyterian explaining the position of the various sections. Reports were heard from the various Auxiliaries. Missions Bands and Circles showing the progress made by each since the formation of the new United Societies. A discussion followed on the best means of increasing the givings so that every effort could be made to further the work. Systematic giving either by mite boxes, or envelopes was strongly recommended as bringing the best results.

Mrs. W. S. Gordon, Kingston, gave an excellent address on the temperance question before the public, urging the women to forget party politics and remember only the great moral issue at stake. In her address she paid glowing tribute to Hon. W. F. Nickle and the stand he has taken. The following resolution, moved by Mrs. W. S. Gordon and seconded by Mrs. J. F. Macrae, was passed by the large audience present:

Resolved, That we, the ladies of the W. M. S. of the United Church meeting in convention, heartily endorse the stand taken by Hon. W. F. Nickle, and pledge ourselves to stand by the Ontario Temperance Act.

Mrs. Tracey, Kingston, sang a sacred solo with sweetness and expression. A delicious supper was served by the ladies of Cataragui at the close of the meeting.
