SINCLAIR ABLE TO FORM GOVERNMENT

Should the Ferguson Cabinet Cease to Function, Liberal Leader Says.

Brantford, Nov. 24.—Speaking before an enthusiastic audience which crowded the Brant Theatre here last night to the doors, William E. N. Sinclair, K.C., Liberal Leader, drew vociferous applause when reiterating his policy that the will of the people should prevail in regard to the O. T. A. Disposing of idle statements that if the Ferguson Government was defeated at the election the Liberal party would not be able to carry on, Mr. Sinclair said: "I can assure you that if in the judgment of the people the Ferguson Government should cease to function there will be no trouble whatever in my forming a Government to the credit of the Province and to the satisfaction of the people." (Applause.)

For Sake of Youth. Palmerston, Nov. 24.—Premier Ferguson told two large audiences of Northeast Wellington electors here last night that in the present election they faced the alternative of either letting their boys be stung by the bootlegging adlers that move in the night or of supporting the Government's policy that would mean "no sale" of liquor legally to minors, and which, he claimed, would put the only adequate check on the illicit traffickers. "For," said the Premier, "they're not going to bootleg in this Province if I know it. I'm going to enforce this law, and one of the chief reasons why I'm going to enforce it is because there are a lot of salaried trumpeters around the country who are saying I don't intend to. Why shouldn't this Government be so conscientiously interested in and concerned with this great moral issue as a lot of people who are getting so much a day to hear themselves talk?"

Father W. A. Fletcher of Pak River, Mass., and seven nuns survived raids made by gangs of pirates on the steamer Waspoi in China. They were robbed and locked in a small room.

Horace P. Chamberlain, one of the organizers of the Imperial Oil Company of Canada, died in Buffalo, N.Y., on Tuesday night, aged seventy-four years.

Edinburgh, Scotland, to-day welcomed the premiers who have been attending the Imperial Conference. Leonid Krasin, Russian Soviet charge d'affaires in London, died this morning of pernicious anaemia. All hope has been abandoned of rescuing the miners entrapped in a mine near Lethbridge, Alta. Queen Marie and her children left New York to-day for Europe.
