**THE BOARD OF TRADE SUPPORT BY-LAWS**

**Gave Warm Endorsement to Five By-laws to Go Before the Ratepayers.**

All five by-laws will go before the ratepayers at the coming municipal election—that of granting a fixed assessment of \$1,000 to the McKelvey & Birch Ltd., the Monarch Battery Company Ltd., the sanctioning of the loan of \$5,000 to the Kingston Public Library, the expenditure of \$25,000 on repairs to the City Buildings and a similar amount for repairs and alterations at the Fair Grounds, received the warm endorsement of the members of the Board of Trade, at a meeting held on Wednesday night. After a thorough and most interesting discussion of all the by-laws, a motion was moved by Ex-Ald. W. H. Craig and seconded by Ex-Ald. C. S. Anglin, asking the Board to endorse all the by-laws, and the motion was carried by a unanimous vote.

The president, T. G. Bishop, presided at the meeting, which was called for the special purpose of discussing the by-laws to come before the ratepayers.

At the request of the president, Mayor Angrove explained the programme of work which had been carried out on the exterior of the city buildings, and that intended for the interior of the buildings, decided on by the council at a recent meeting. The mayor also spoke of the other by-laws and stated that he was in favor of all, and asked for the support of the ratepayers.

"Anything that will be for the benefit of the city you can depend on me to support," said Mayor Angrove, "whether I am in office or not."

Ald. McCartney gave a detailed account of the work undertaken at the city buildings, and the programme proposed, and stated that it was work that should be undertaken, to protect the city buildings, especially for fire protection. Ald. McCartney said he was not in favor of the Fair Grounds by-law.

Ald. R. E. Kent, chairman of the finance committee of the City Council, also gave the members information regarding action taken by the Council.

Ex-Ald. W. H. Craig spoke in favor of the Fair Grounds by-law and Ald. Anderson remarked that the grounds were a disgrace. Ald. Kent pointed out that one great need at the Fair Grounds was a proper drainage.

Mr. Francis King spoke on behalf of the Library by-law, stating that it was a by-law for the people to confirm what City Council had done, or in other words, to say that Council was right in making the loan of \$5,000 to finish the work on the new building.

Mr. C. A. Macpherson spoke on behalf of the McKelvey & Birch Ltd., asking for a fixed assessment of \$1,000 on their new building for the manufacture of fuel oil tanks. He pointed out that the average pay roll would amount to \$100,000. This year the company has given employment to 125 to 140 men, and it was expected that the pay roll would reach \$125,000 or more. There were forty men on the outside staff, and their money of course, came to Kingston, as they were Kingston men. Mr. Macpherson said it was an industry with a small beginning, but he felt that the city should encourage the smaller industries, which would become an asset to the city. This

industry was a new one, and gave every promise of expanding. President Bishop stated that he was glad to welcome to the city any industry, and he felt that all the Kingston business men had the same opinion.

Mr. Isaac Cohen addressed the board on behalf of the Monarch Battery Company Ltd. He stated that the company was asking for a fixed assessment of \$1,000 on the building on Montreal street, one block in all. It had been reported that a request was being made for a fixed assessment on all the company's property, but this was not the case. If business continued to grow, and he had every reason to believe that it would, the company would erect an additional building. He said the company paid out over \$500 per week. He felt that a Kingstonian should be encouraged in his business by the city, just the same as a stranger coming into the city. The members engaged in a thorough discussion of all the by-laws, and at the close the motion of Messrs. Craig and Anglin was passed by a unanimous vote.

J. G. Elliott spoke in a very optimistic manner, stating, "we are starting things and moving in the right direction. I think it is only right that we should encourage the smaller industries. Every good thing starts in a small way." The speaker expressed the hope that all five by-laws would be carried.

President Bishop extended thanks to all the members who had taken part in the interesting discussion.
