RETURNING OFFICER MADE A MISTAKE

In Declaring W. D. Black Elected, Justice Rose's Judgment Holds.

The following is an abstract from the judgment of Justice Rose in the Frontenac-Addington nomination case of Mr. Frank Anglin:
 "If the question as to Mr. Anglin's compliance with Sec. 58 (5) were open upon this motion, my opinion upon the materials before me would be the opinion which I expressed during the argument and which I have found no reason to change, viz., that the Act was complied with; that the nomination paper was accompanied by Mr. Anglin's consent in writing; that it was the returning officer's duty to grant a poll for taking the vote, and that in declaring Mr. Black to be elected he was acting without authority. Upon the papers produced it seems to me that the returning officer has made a mistake which ought to be corrected if there is power to correct it, and I proceed therefore to examine the question raised by Mr. Greer as to the jurisdiction of the Court."
