YOUTH OF NAPANEE DECLARE FOR O.T.A.

Mass Meeting in the Armouries—Two Shop Breakers Are Sentenced.

Napanee, Nov. 29.—One of the largest mass meetings ever held in the armouries took place on Monday evening when the young people of the surrounding district of Napanee gathered to hear the views expressed by prominent young people of Ontario on the vital question which confronts the electors on Wednesday, W. T. MacKenzie, president of the Young People of St. Andrew's Church, acted as chairman. St. Andrew's orchestra supplemented by the Napanee Collegiate orchestra and others provided excellent music while the crowd was assembling. Mr. Roy Richard of Albert College, Belleville, led in community singing for a few minutes at the opening of the meeting.

J. L. Murray of the Napanee Collegiate staff was the first speaker who put before the audience two questions: "Has the Ontario Temperance Act failed?" and "Is the proposed legislation of the province of Ontario going to benefit the people of to-day?" These questions Mr. Murray dealt with fairly through his own experience and left a very favorable impression on the audience as to which legislation was the better.

Kenneth Stubbs, of Trinity College, and Boy Mayor of Toronto, gave his views on the questions at issue and drew the attention of the young people to the slogan, "Youth Refuses to Retreat." The young people of to-day have sufficient temptations before them without adding the temptation of the government liquor store around the corner. The proposed legislation, he said, where liquor would be sold by the glass would only increase drunkenness and decrease bootlegging.

Miss Marion Wales, B.A., of Toronto University, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Wales, Napanee was the next speaker, who gave some laudatory thoughts on the situation of to-day. We have a beautiful country and why lessen that beauty by improper legislation. We are striving to improve our moral status and Wednesday's issue is not a question of politics but a moral issue.

Charles McRae of Knox College, Toronto, and ex-boy mayor, put the final touches to the meeting in a brilliant and forceful speech, telling us that the young people of to-day are going forward until victory is theirs.

Mr. C. L. Graham, president of the Young Peoples of Trinity Church, read the resolution which bespoke the feelings of the young people in this district as regards the slanderous statements being proclaimed by prominent politicians relative to the moral tone of the young people of Ontario. Miss Margaret Wootton of the Napanee Collegiate staff, seconded the motion.

The rally was one of the strongest meetings ever held in Napanee in the interests of the O.T.A., and an unanimous vote was taken to sustain the present legislation as regards the liquor question.

A silver collection was taken at the meeting and a substantial sum was realized to defray the expenses of the meeting, wholly instigated and carried on by the Young People of Napanee.
