A LIVELY TIME AT CATARAQUI

Municipal Nomination Meeting Held—Warden Graham Answers Some Criticisms.

The nomination meeting for the township of Kingston held in the township hall, Cataraqui, Monday afternoon was one of the liveliest events on record.

Reeve C. J. Graham who announced that he would be a candidate for the position of deputy reeve, appeared to be the target at which some of the speakers directed their line of argument.

R. C. Hawkey, one of the councillors who has decided to be a candidate for the deputy reeve, and will be Mr. Graham's opponent in the fight, said a few things that rather annoyed Reeve Graham.

During the time that Mr. Graham was giving a report of his stewardship of the past year, he said that it had been stated in different parts of the township that he had been kicked out of the Salvation Army. He stated that when he had heard these remarks he decided to write the Salvation Army Headquarters at Toronto and in reply Ensign Falle, officer in charge of the local corps, had received the following letter, which he read.

ENSIGN FALLE: Dear Ensign: Re Mr. Christie Graham

I have written to Toronto for information why Mr. Graham left the Salvation Army, and I am authorized to write to you that Mr. Christie Graham disassociated himself from the Army of his own accord and without any reflection upon his integrity.

I trust that this will be satisfactory to Mr. Graham and all concerned.

Mr. Hawkey got the reeve to his feet when he stated that Mr. Graham had not told his audience how much he had received in connection with the purchase of the steam roller.

Two for Reeve. Although four were nominated for the position of reeve, it is almost certain that the fight will be between W. R. Aylesworth, the present deputy reeve, and W. E. Cordukes, who was deputy two years ago, but was not in the council last year.

Reeve Graham's Address. Reeve Graham started his address by praising the stand which he and the deputy reeve of the township had taken in connection with the revaluation of the county of Frontenac.

Mr. Graham claimed that for years the salary of the Road Superintendent R. H. Fair, had been paid out of the county good road money instead of the suburban roads paying its share.

It is not true that the township of Kingston is in debt," said the speaker, and he read the itemized report of the financial standing, a copy of which was summarized in the Whig on Monday.

Reeve Graham Explains. When answering the statement of Mr. Hawkey, Reeve Graham said that he had been elected warden by a vote of eleven to six.

(Continued from Page 1.) down; two grants had been made by the Legislature to Queen's University to be used in extending Queen's medical school facilities at the Kingston General Hospital; \$125,000 had been granted to establish a central heating plant for the university, and only within the past few weeks he had assisted the Kingston Health Association in transferring the Mowat Sanatorium to the Provincial Government so that \$150,000 became available for use in Kingston in treating tubercular patients.

Other things which he had been able to accomplish were legislation providing compensation for miners who contracted certain diseases because of their work underground; a board of regents who passed on the qualifications of all drugless practitioners; the act which made both parties to an accident liable for damages; and the act which allowed a woman to obtain heavy damages from anyone who slandered her character although she might not have suffered any pecuniary loss because of the slander.

In concluding Mr. Nickle again returned to the liquor legislation and stated that with motor cars as plentiful as they now are there would be no wet or dry spots in Ontario if Government Control carried but they would all be wet. He had searched Mr. Ferguson's policy very closely and he had not seen mentioned in any place where importation from a wet part to a dry part would be prohibited. He asked if it could be possible that the industrialists, social workers and economists who had testified to the benefits of the Ontario Temperance Act could all be mistaken.

The meeting closed with round after round of applause for Mr. Nickle.

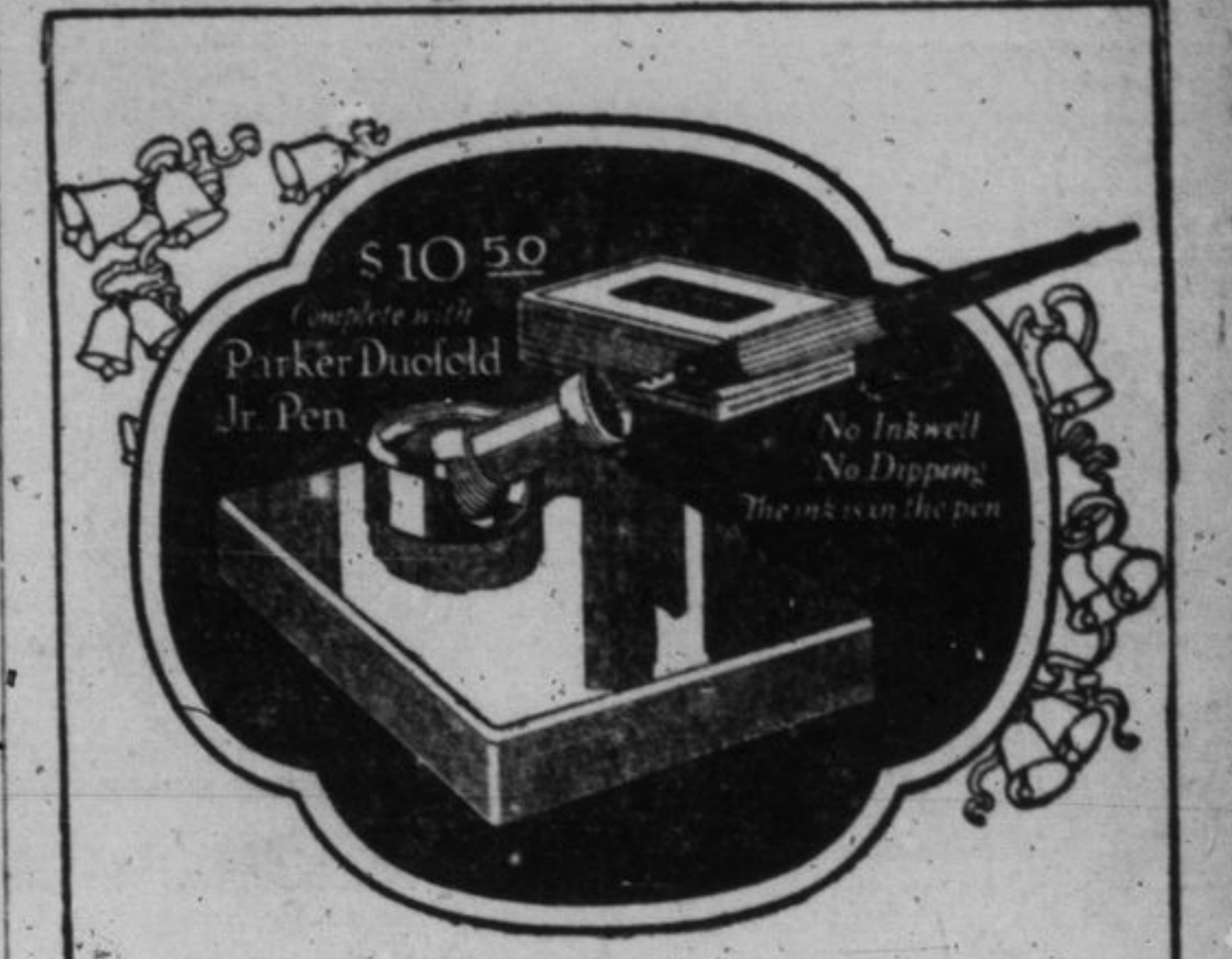

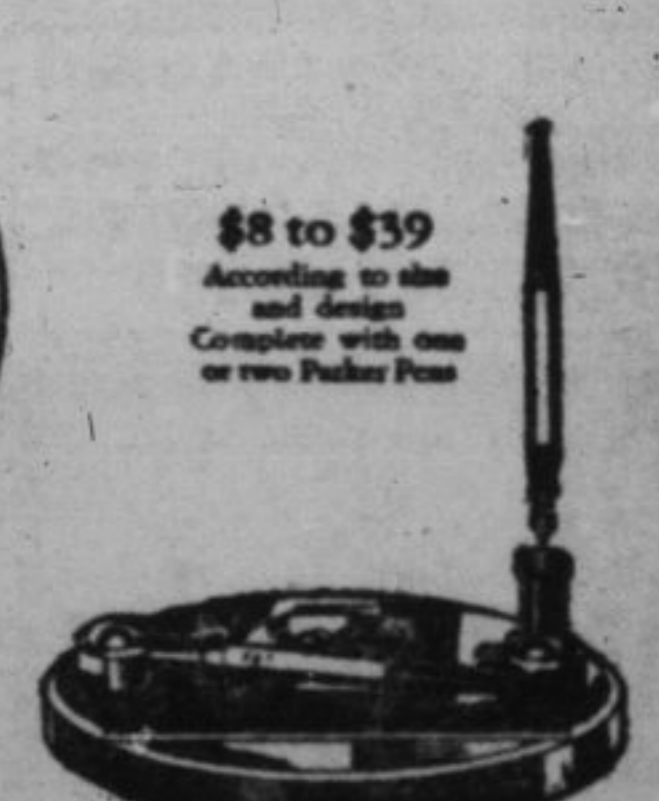
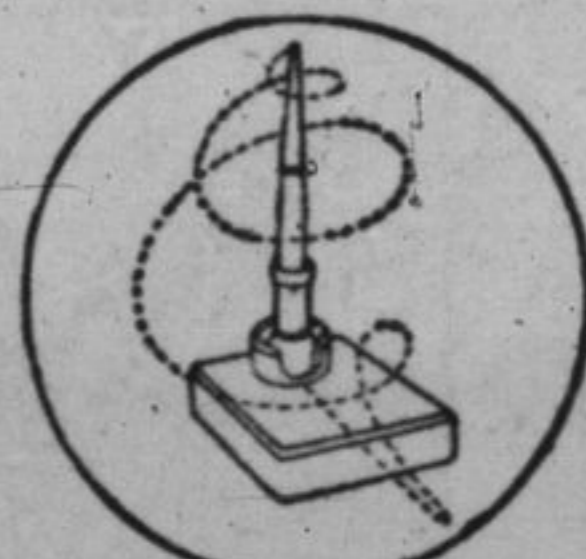
