TO CONSIDER REPORT
Of the Engineers on Great Lakes Ship Canal.
Washington, Nov. 29—Hon. Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce, as chairman of the United States section of the International Commission on the great lakes ship canal project, has called a meeting of the section for December 16th, to go over the report of the engineers on the St. Lawrence waterway which was made public last week. It is likely that the United States section will have a report to make upon the engineers' findings. The chief point of importance, Mr. Hoover said today, is in the fact that comparison between costs and advantages of a constructing ship way into our Great Lakes via St. Lawrence, or through New York state entirely on the United States side, will soon be available.

Meeting between two bodies concerned will be held at 2.30 o'clock this afternoon in general offices of Canadian Pacific Railway. Railways will be represented by Sir Henry W. Thornton, K. B. E., chairman of Canadian National Railways, and E. W. Nesty, K.C., president of Canadian Pacific, while S. N. Berry, senior vice president of O. R. C. and his colleagues will represent the men.
