MISCELLANY.

The following is a description of the MINES Professor SILLIMAN visited in Derbysbire, England.

THE Owdin Mine is believed to have been wrought by the Romans and Saxons. However this may be, the enormous mass of rubbish collected near its mouth, demonstrates that it has been worked for a very long period. It is fituated near the foot of Mam Tor.

The first thing that attracted my attention on entering the small huts around the mine, was the beating of the ore. This is performed by women; they break it to pieces with a kind of mallet; it is then fifted, washed, and fent away to be fmelted.

My guide conducted me into his wardrobe where I put on a miner's dress. It confifted of an old tow-cloth pair of breeches, coarse and dirty; a woolen short jacket in the same condition, and an old hat, with the brim all cut off, except three or four inches, and that turned behind.

With a lighted candle stuck into a piece of clay, I now followed my guide into these dark, damp and folitary regions. He carried a lighted candle in his hand, and two more were suspended from his neck.

The mine opens into the fide of the mountain, between two walls of lime stone; the entrance is about two feet wide and five feet. high. Of course we went in, steoping, and with very little room to spare on either side. In this manner we proceeded through a paffage always narrow, and varying in breadth according to the breadth of the vein. The descent was gradual, and the bottom of the passage being every where deep, with mud and water, was rendered somewhat more practicable by boards and timber, which were, however, generally buried in the mire,

We went forward flooping; fometimes almost creeping, and often through passages for narrow that it was need flary to go fideways. Over our heads was a flooring of boards laid on wooden ratters, to fur port the louic car and flones; from the cof the water was cry where droppin and trickling down walls, fo that we then kept continue

Our path freque 40 or 50 feet, like there's I gallery, fimilar to th Through this lowe mine runs off. Some care was of courle ne-

ceffary, in paffing by these thafts, left we should step into them, but they are generally in some measure covered with boards .-In this manner we travelled on half a mile into the bowels of the mountain.

When we had reached the end of our journey, we ascended into a great cavern, which they had excavated to the dillance of 40 feet above our heads. The afcent was by means of timbers fixed in the crevices of the rock, like the rounds of a ladder. Here I took hold of the pick axe, and broke off some of the lead ore to bring away as specimens.

We returned a part of the way, and then took an excursion into another vein which diverged from the principal one at an acute angle; this vein has been explored for a mile, but we contented ourselves with going only half this diftance.

In our progress through the mine I had the satisfaction of seeing, in their native situations, the most important ores of lead; the beautiful crystalizations of flour spar, and calcareous spar; the sulphat of barytes, native copperas, and extensive strata of lime flone, filled with the most curious petrifactions. The scene was to me extremely interefting and instructive, and two hours passed rapidly away in the mine. The ore is conveyed to day light by means of small waggons. The nature of the fituation necessarily precludes the employment of any don.eftic animal, and the miners therefore act in their stead; they are literally harnessed to the waggons, with collars and traces, and thus travel back and forward through these dismal regions. They are obliged to go at least half a mile with every load, and all the way through darkness, and very often their los is nothing but rubbish, for, it is indifferniable that this be constantly removed otherwife the gallery would be fo obstructed that no work could be done. Let they usually fpend their whole lives bere, and feem a very cheerful fet of men. My guide has been 25 years in the mine, and his father and grandfather had confumed all their days in the

lame place. We now returned to the light, bringing with as specimens of the differ
