## POLITICAL MISCELLANY.

From the York Gazette Extra.—Feb. 4.

An Address to the Inhabitants of Upper Canada.

GENTLEMEN,

AT a crisis like the present, when the warlike preparations of our neighbours are brought to our very doors, and the attack of the Canadas become a common theme of conversation, not only amongst the idle and speculating part of the community, but is gravely brought forward in Congress as a National Measure; it is high time that we should be prepared to meet the blow, aimed not only at our prosperity, but against the more industrious & virtuous classes in both Countries. My object is to lay before my readers a fair and candid statement of the relative situations of the two countries, now brought to the brink of this awful precipice, and to present a slight sketch of the evils that must result from this most unnatural and detestable policy of the American Government.

It is now evident that war can no longer be avoided, as the calculations of the Democrats, founded upon the forbearance of England, are evidently erroneous.—All their bullying and swaggering about the great exploits they were to perform, such as marching into Canada, &c. if she did not rescind her Decrees, and abandon those Maritime Rights, upon which her very existence as a Nation depends; together with many other civil things they were ready to have dictated to her, having produced no effect whatever upon the British Nation, or her Councils. The consequence of all this is loud and noisy preparation for war. This is an event the corrupt and venal wretches who have fold their Country to our implacable enemy have long been driving at: they have now nearly accomplished their object. An army of 25,000 men are voted to invade and lay waste these Provinces, and when the nature of the American population is considered, we can be at no loss in forming a correct estimate of the description of men composing this Army.—It is not to be supposed that the Yeomanry of the Country will quit their comfortable homes, and abandon their families and every tie in life, to expose themselves to the bayonet or tomahawk, in fighting the battles of Bonaparte, Madison and Co. It is not my wish, or intention, to deny the Patriotism or Courage of the American People, as I firmly believe, if the cause of their Country required the sacrifice, they would act as they have done on former occasions, and not be found wanting in either. Whilst we are appreciating our enemy, it is both folly and injustice to under rate or withhold from him his due. But there will not be many men found in the invading Army possessed of those virtues. The American who really loves his Country, cannot but deplore the wickedness and folly of his Government who have thus dragged the nation into a war
