Proclamation.

PROVINCE OF UPPER CANADA.
ISAAC BROCK, Esquire, President administering the Government of the Province of Upper Canada, & Major-General commanding His Majesty's Forces within the same.

To all to whom it may concern—*Greeting.*
Whereas information has been received, that divers persons have recently come into this province, with a seditious intent to disturb the tranquility thereof, and to endeavour to alienate the minds of His Majesty's Subjects from His Person and Government; I hereby require and enjoin the several persons authorized, to carry into effect a certain statute, passed in the Forty-fourth year of his Majesty's reign, intituled, "An Act for the better securing this Province against all seditious attempts or designs to disturb the tranquility thereof," to be vigilant in the execution of their duty, and strictly to enquire into the behaviour and conduct of all such persons as may be subject to the provisions of the said Act; and I do also charge and require all his Majesty's Good and Loyal subjects within this Province, to be aiding and assisting the said Persons, in the execution of the powers vested in them by the said Act.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Arms, at York, this Twenty-fourth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Twelve, and in the Fifty-second of his Majesty's Reign.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT OF LOWER CANADA

Quebec, February 21, 1812.
This Day at 2 o'Clock, His Excellency the Governor in Chief came down in state, to the Legislative Council Chamber, and being seated on the Throne, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was sent to command the immediate attendance of the Assembly, which being come up, His Excellency was pleased to open the Session with the following SPEECH:—

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, The Prince Regent in the name, and on the behalf of His Majesty, having been graciously pleased to honor me with the appointment of Governor in Chief of the British American Provinces, and having expressly commanded me to assume the Administration of Lower Canada, I hastened to take upon me this important charge.

"The Commission by which I have been appointed, has been issued for some time, but, as it has not yet reached me, I continue to administer the Government under the provisional authority with which I was honored in the first instance by His Majesty's command.

"I lament that I cannot gratify your anxious expectation, with any

favorable information respecting the health of our venerable and beloved Sovereign. His Majesty still suffers, and the paternal care he was graciously pleased to extend to every part of his Dominions, continues to be exercised by the Prince Regent.

"I feel pride and satisfaction in congratulating you on the brilliant achievements which have taken place in the deliverance of Portugal, and for the rescue of Spain from the tyranny of the Chief Ruler in France. Such events cannot be contemplated without acknowledging in humble thankfulness, the interposition of the Great Sovereign of the Universe, who has permitted British Valor to be the means of dispensing his benefits to those unhappy nations.

"Notwithstanding the astonishing changes that mark the age in which we live, the Inhabitants of this portion of the Empire have witnessed but as remote spectators, the awful scenes which desolate Europe; and while Britain, "built by nature for herself, against infection and the hand of war," has had her political existence involved in the fate of the surrounding Nations, you have, hitherto undisturbed, in the habitations of your Fathers, viewed without alarm, the distant storm, which now seems bending its course towards this peaceful and happy region.

"Should the unfriendly disposition of the government of the United States, continue unchanged, by the wise measures and magnanimous conduct of the Prince Regent, it will require no ordinary exercise of loyalty to withstand its effects, and no common energy in the discharge of the important duties we shall be called upon to perform.

"Viewing these circumstances, I recommend an increased and unremitting care and vigilance in securing the Colony from either open invasion or insidious aggression. And I hope the Provincial Parliament will testify the loyal disposition by which it is animated, in its early attention to those Acts which experience has proved to be essential for the preservation of His Majesty's government as by law happily established in this Colony, and also by its readiness in supplying His Majesty with such aid as shall be suited to the exigencies of the times, by enabling his loyal Canadian Subjects to assist in repelling any sudden attack made by a tumultuary force, and effectually to participate in the defence of their country, against a regular invasion at any future period.

"I look to your public spirit and your love of the general good, for the amelioration of the internal communications throughout the Province, for the increase of Commerce and the encouragement of Agriculture, so that the most distant inhabitant may become sensible of the solicitude entertained for his comfort and welfare by the government protecting him.

"Mr Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, I have directed to be laid before you, a statement of the Pro-
