PROVINCE OF UPPER CANADA. ISAAC BROCK, Esquire, President administering the Government of the Province of Upper Canada, & Major-General commanding His Majesty's Forces within the same.

To all to whom it may concern-Greeting. Whereas information has been received, that divers persons have recently come into this province, with a feditious intent to disturb the tranquility thereof, and to endeavour to alienate the minds of His Majesty's Subjects from His Forty-fourth year of his Majesty's reign, intituled, " An Act for the better fecuring this Province against all feditious attempts or defigns to disturb the tranquility thereof," to be vigilant in the execution of their duty, and firictly to enquire into the behaviour and conduct of all fuch perions as may be subject to the provisions of the faid Act; and I de also charge and require all his Majesty's Good and Loyal subjects within this Province, to be aiding and affifting the faid Persons, in the execution of the powers vefted in them by the faid Act.

Given under my Hand and Scal, at Arms, at York, this Twenty-fourth day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Twelve, and in the Fifty-fecond of his Majesty's Reign. ISAAC BROCK, President.

PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT OF LOWER CANADA

Quebec, February 21, 1812. This Day at 2 o'Clock, His Excellency the Governor in Chief came down in state, to the Legislative Council Chamber, and being feated on the Throne, the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod was fent to command the immediate attendance of the Assembly, which being come up, His Excellency was pleased to open the Session with the following SPI ECH:

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, " Gentlemen of the House of Affembly,

"The Prince Regent in the name, and on the behalf of His Majesty, having been graciously pleafed to honor me with the appointment of Governor in Chief of the British American Provinces, and having expressly commanded me to assume the Administration of Lower Canada, I haftened to take upon me this important charge.

"The Commission by which I have been appointed, has been iffued for fome time, but, as it has not yet reached me, I continue to tant inhabitant may become fenadminister the Government under the provisional authority with which I was honored in the first instance by His Majesty's command.

"I lament that I cannot gratify your anxious expectation, with any

"Notwithstanding the astonishing changes that mark the age in which we live, the Inhabitans of this portion of the Empire have witnessed but as remote spectators, the awful fcenes which defolate Lurope; and while Britain, "built by nature for herfelf, against infection and the hand of war," has had her political existence involved in the fate of the furrounding Nations, you have, hitherto undiffurbed, in the habitations of your Fathers, viewed without alarm, the distant frorm, which now

"Should the unfriendly disposition of the government of the United States, continue unchanged, by the wife meafures and magnanimous conduct of the Prince Regent, it will require no ordinary exercise of loyalty to withstand its effects, and no common energy in the difcharge of the important duties we shall be called upon to perform.

"Viewing these circumstances, I recommend an increased and unremitting care and vigilance in fecuring the Colony from either open invation or infidious aggreffion. And I hope the Provincial Parliament will testify the loyal disposition by which it is animated, in its early attention to those Acts which experience has proved to be effential for the prefervation of His Majesty's government as by law happily established in this Colony, and also by its readiness in fupplying His Majesty with such aid as shall be fuited to the exigencies of the times, by enabling his loyal Canadian Subjects to affift in repelling any fudden attack made by a tumultuary force, and effectually to participate in the defence of their country, against a regular invalion at any future period.

"I look to your public spirit and your love of the general good, for the amelioration of the internal communications throughout the Province, for the increase of Commerce and the encouragement of Agriculture, fo that the molt diffible of the folicitude entertained for his comfort and welfare by the government protecting him.
