The injunction of fecrecy, in relation to A PART of the Proceedings of congress having been this day removed, it appears that in the course of the secret sitting, the following Acr was paffed:

AN ACT laying an Embargo on all the Ships and Veffels in the Ports and Harbours of the United States,

for a limited time.

BE it cnacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of Anterica in Congress assembled, That an Embargo be and hereby is laid for the term of ninety days from and after the passing of this act, on all ships and veffels in the ports and places within the limits or jurifdiction of the United States, cleared or not cleared, bound to any foreign port or places; and that no clearance be furnished to any ship or vessel bound to fuch foreign port or place, except veffels in ballast with the consent of the President of the United States; and that the Presi- mitigating or remitting the fordear he authorised to give such instructions to the officers of the revenue, and of the navy and revenuc cutters of the United States, as shall appear best adapted for carrying the fame into full effect: Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the departure of any foreign ship or vessel, either in ballast or with the goods, wares and merchandize on board of fuch foreign ship or veffel when notified of this act.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That during the continuance of this act, no registered or sea letter veffel fhall be allowed to depart from any one port of the United States to any other within the same, unless the master, owner, confignce or factor of fuch vessel shall first give bond, with one or more fureties, to the collector of the district, from which she is bound to depart, in a fum of double the value of the veilel and cargo conditioned that the goods, wares or merchandize, with which she shall be laden, shall be relanded in some port of the U.S.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That if any ship or vessel shall during the continuance of this act, depart from any port of the United States without a clearance or permit, or if any ship or vessel shall contrary to the provisions of this act, proceed to a foreign port or place or trade with or put on board

of anyother shipor vesselany goods, wares or merchandife, of foreign ordomesticgrowth or manufacture fuch thip or veffel, goods, wares and merchandise shall be wholly forfeited, and if the fame shall not be feized, the owner or owners, agent freighter or factors, of any fuch thip or veffel thall for every fuch offence forfeit and pay a fum equal to double the value of the fhip or veffel and cargo, and shall never thereafter be allowed to credit for duties on any goods, wares or merchandize imported by him or them into any of the ports of the United States, and the mafter or commander of fuch ship or veffel, as well as all other persons who thall knowingly be concerned in fuch prohibited foreign voyage shall each respectively forfeit and pay a fum not exceeding twenty thousand, nor less than one thousand dollars for every fuch offence whether the veffel be feized and condemned or not, and the oath of affirmation of any mafter or commander, knowingly offending against the provisions of this fection, shall ever thereafter be inadmissible before any collector of the cuftoms of the United States.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That all premalines and harfaitances arising under, or incurred by virprofecuted and recovered; with cost of suit, by action of debt, in the name of the United States of America, or by indictment or information in any court having competent jurisdiction to try the fame; and shall be distributed and accounted for in the manner prefcribed by the act, entitled, "An act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage," passed the second day of March; one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine; and fuch penalties may be examined, mitigated or remitted, in like manner, and under like conditions, regulations and restrictions, as are prescribed, authorized and directed by the act, entitled, " An Act to provide for feitures, penalties and difabilities accruing in certain cales therein mentioned," paffed the third day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-feven, and made perpetual by an act palled the eleventh day of February, one thoufand eight hundred.

Provided, That all penalties and forfeitures, which shall have been incurred by virtue of this act, previous to the expiration thereof may and shall thereafter be recovcred and distributed in like manner, as if this act had continued in full force and virtue.
