

enemy, as far as respected that city and Carthage. The expedition which lately sailed from Gibraltar, had arrived at the latter place. A part of Marmont's army, about 4,000 men, had arrived before Alicante on the 15th January; they threw some grenades into the town, and then summoned it to surrender, but this being refused, they retired. Great fears are entertained for the approach of Suchet's army.

Dispatches from the Earl of Wellington, dated Trenada, the 19th ult. were received by Government on Saturday, an extract from which is given in the London Gazette. From the official and private advices, it appears that Marmont's army has extended its front; the first, fourth and sixth divisions are in the neighborhood of Talavera and Toledo; the main body, according to the private accounts, remains in the vicinity of Salamanca, and Villa Franca, while the right wing has been marched from Zemorá to Benevento.

The two last sets of Despatches forwarded by Mr. Ruffel for Mr. Joel Barlow, by cartels to Morlaix, it will be learnt with surprize, have been intercepted, and this Gentleman has, we believe, determined to send no further communications to France until the cause be explained.

From the Extra National Intelligencer of April 4.
The injunction of secrecy, in relation to A PART of the Proceedings of congress having been this day removed, it appears that in the course of the secret sitting, the following Act was passed:
AN ACT laying an Embargo on all the Ships and Vessels in the Ports and Harbours of the United States, for a limited time.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That an Embargo be and hereby is laid for the term of ninety days from and after the passing of this act, on all ships and vessels in the ports and places within the limits or jurisdiction of the United States, cleared or not cleared, bound to any foreign port or places; and that no clearance be furnished to any ship or vessel except vessels in ballast with the consent of the President of the United States; and that the President be authorized to give such instructions to the officers of the revenue, and of the navy and revenue cutters of the United States, as shall appear best adapted for carrying the same into full effect: Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to prevent the departure of any foreign ship or vessel, either in ballast or with the goods, wares and merchandize on board of such foreign ship or vessel when notified of this act.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That during the continuance of this act, no registered or sea letter vessel shall be allowed to depart from any one port of the United States to any other within the same, unless the master, owner, consignee or factor of such vessel shall first give bond, with one or more sureties, to the collector of the district, from which she is bound to depart, in a sum of double the value of the vessel and cargo conditioned that the goods, wares or merchandize, with which she shall be laden, shall berelanded in some port of the U.S.

The Marquis of Hartford was yesterday, and not before, appointed Lord Chamberlain, by the Prince Regent, and received the Staff of Office accordingly.
Lord Melville is to succeed Mr. Yorke, as first Lord of the Admiralty.
We understand that the Earl of Yarborough is to be Vice-Chamberlain.

A Lisbon Mail has just arrived, by which we have accounts from the Peninsula to the 24th of February. The Lisbon Gazette of the 16th contains an extract of an official dispatch from Lord Wellington to the Portuguese government, dated Trenada, February 12; but this does not furnish us with any particulars relative to the late movements of General Hill. Nothing new was known at Lisbon on the 23d.

The *Princess Charlotte's* packet has arrived at Falmouth with mails from Malta and Gibraltar. Ballastieros, in a letter to the Government of Algiers, dated 3d February, speaks of advantage obtained over the enemy, which, however, is represented by a French officer taken prisoner, as "an insignificant affair." of any other ship or vessel any goods, wares or merchandize, of foreign or domestic growth or manufacture such ship or vessel, goods, wares and merchandize shall be wholly forfeited, and if the same shall not be seized, the owner or owners, agent freighter or factors, of any such ship or vessel shall for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum equal to double the value of the ship or vessel and cargo, and shall never thereafter be allowed to credit for duties on any goods, wares or merchandize imported by him or them into any of the ports of the United States, and the master or commander of such ship or vessel, as well as all other persons who shall knowingly be concerned in such prohibited foreign voyage shall each respectively forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty thousand, nor less than one thousand dollars for every such offence whether the vessel be seized and condemned or not, and the oath of affirmation of any master or commander, knowingly offending against the provisions of this section, shall ever thereafter be inadmissible before any collector of the customs of the United States.

Sec. 4. *And be it further enacted,* That all penalties and forfeitures arising under, or incurred by virtue of this act, may be sued for, prosecuted and recovered, with cost of suit, by action of debt, in the name of the United States of America, or by indictment or information in any court having competent jurisdiction to try the same; and shall be distributed and accounted for in the manner prescribed by the act, entitled, "An act to regulate the collection of duties on imports and tonnage," passed the second day of March; one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine; and such penalties may be examined, mitigated or remitted, in like manner, and under like conditions, regulations and restrictions, as are prescribed, authorized and directed by the act, entitled, "An Act to provide for mitigating or remitting the forfeitures, penalties and disabilities accruing in certain cases therein mentioned," passed the third day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, and made perpetual by an act passed the eleventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred.

Provided, That all penalties and forfeitures, which shall have been incurred by virtue of this act, previous to the expiration thereof may and shall thereafter be recovered and distributed in like manner, as if this act had continued in full force and virtue.

The *Arethusa* has brought home a number of Africans, taken out of a Portuguese slave-ship. The slaves, it is said, soon after leaving the Gold Coast, rose on the crew, and killed them all, with the exception of one boy; it is even stated that they ate part of the bodies. The ship, after beating about at the mercy of the waves, was taken possession of by an English ship of war and the slaves were put on board different ships. Those that have arrived are mostly young men, but extremely filthy in their mode of living; they prefer blood, entrails, and raw meat, to dressed food.
