Sir,—Biographical sketches are more useful than abstract reasonings, because they present us with principles in living operation producing effects corresponding with their excellence or imperfection. Being embodied as it were in the narrative, they make a deep impression on the heart—we enter into the views and feelings of our Hero, and if he be not too far removed from the sphere in which we are destined to act, we live his life over during the perusal. But not to weary you with mentioning the numerous advantages of narratives drawn from common life, I send you a short account of Wendal, a young man of promising parts and of good expectations, but who was ruined from a cause not perhaps uncommon. Wendal, after finishing his education at a respectable school, was taken by a friend of his father to be instructed in the profession of the law. As an inmate in his master's family he was treated like one of the children, and enjoyed many indulgencies to which the other Clerks were not thought entitled. It was a great misfortune for Wendal that his master delighted much in company, and lived extravagantly, considering the narrowness of his income. Often has he been kept to make one at a card party when he should have been following his studies, often disqualified by the vigils of the evening from attending to business during the whole of next day. At first this continual round of company was exceedingly disagreeable—he received no pleasure from tumultuous dinners where reason seldom spoke, nor from dull evening parties where there was no conversation worthy of remembrance. But he became accustomed to them by degrees; he learned to smile at the inuendos and indelicate jests of the second bottle men—to hear with attention the little chit chat of the ladies, even to partake of their repasts of scandal, and to be exceedingly amused and fascinated with games of hazard. His taste for all these dangerous follies increased as he grew older, and by the time that his Clerkship expired they became necessary to his happiness. When he was admitted to the bar, business flowed in upon him so rapidly, that he seemed to himself to have already more than his old master. He could therefore afford an equal establishment. He purchases a house on credit, furnishes it elegantly, and invites his friends to sumptuous entertainments. When his father and some of his more sober acquaintances ventured to warn him of his danger, he told them that the splendor of his equipage and excellence of his dinners procured him clients, and that the additional expence incurred was more than counterbalanced by the increase of business.
