HISTORICAL.

QUEBEC.

According to democratic opinions the Plains of Abraham are soon to be re-visited by "brave Yankee boys," & crimsoned with the blood of slaughtered Canadians; and as Quebec appears to be the bone for which the Dogs of War are to contend, we think the following Historical account will be read with much interest. [Ver. pap.]

THE history of Quebec is interesting, but too long to be detailed. It has sustained three sieges. The first was in 1680. A considerable army marched from New England, under the command of the Governor of that Province, to invest the place by land, whilst an English fleet sailed up the St. Lawrence to attack it by water. The army was conducted by a party of Iroquois, inimical to the French, but who abandoned their allies in the midst of the wilderness, in consequence of which, the provincials were dispersed, and returned home as they could. Meanwhile, a force was landed from the fleet to make a diversion, but they were promptly attacked by the French and forced to re-embark with great loss. This expedition, therefore, totally failed.

The second was more fortunate. The great Lord Chatham, justly alarmed at the progress the French armies were making in North America, foresaw that the north western continent must soon obey one or other of the rival powers. A formidable armament for the times, consisting of about 15,000 men, in 250 transports, and conveyed by 20 men of war, was fitted out with so much expedition, that it arrived in the river St. Lawrence in June, 1759. It was commanded by General Wolfe and Admiral Saunders. Notwithstanding this promptitude, the enemy was prepared to meet it. He first made an attempt to burn the fleet in the river by fire ships; it was well conducted, and would probably have succeeded, if he had not set fire too soon.

Point Levi was first taken and carried by the English, from whence the town was bombarded. The French, to prevent an investment, had posted their principal force at Montmorenci. The ground was very strong. Wolfe attacked them with the flour of his troops, consisting of all his flank companies; he could not, however, with the most heroic exertions, force their strong positions, and was compelled to retreat to his batteries, leaving 15 hundred of his men on the field. This loss, together with the approach of winter, would have justified a frigid calculating General in giving up the enterprise; but Wolfe was resolved to conquer or die. He did both.

* Had this expedition been delayed a fortnight, or even a week longer, it had as certainly failed, as some expeditions have done during the revolutionary war, from the same cause.
