OFFICIAL DETAILS OF THE ARMY.

GENERAL ORDER.

Head-Quarters,

Camp-Bank of Lake Erie, 15 miles S. W. ? Port, Talbot, Aug. 11, 1812, 60'clock P. M. 5

The Troops will hold themselves in readiness, and will embark in the boats at 12 o'clock this night. It is Major-General Brock's positive orders, that none of the boats go a-head of that in which is the Head-Quarters, where a light will be shewn during the night.

The officers commanding the different boats will immediately inspect the arms and ammunition of the men, and see that they are constantly kept in a state for immediate service. As the Troops are now to pass through a part of t'c country which is known to have been vifited by the enemy's patroles, a Captain with a fulvaltern. and thirty men will mount as a Picket upon the landing of the Boats, and a Sentry will be furniffied for each Boat, who must be regularly relieved, to take charge of the Boat and Baggage. A Patrole from the Picket will be sent out on landing to the distance of a mile from the encampment.

> GINERAL ORDER. Head Quarters,

Pointe aux Pins, Aug. 12, 1812. It is Major-General Brock's intention, should the wind continue fair, to preceed during the night. Officers commanding Boats will therefore pay attention to the order of failing as directed yesterday. The greatest care and attention will be requisite to prevent the Boats from feparating or falling behind. A great part of the Bank to three brigades; the 1st under of the Lake where the Boats will this day pass, is much more dangerous and difficult of access than any we have passed; the Boats will therefore not land excepting in the most extreme necessity, and then great care must be taken to choose the best places for beaching.

The Troops being in the neighborhood of the enemy, every precaution must be taken to guard against surprize.

> GENERAL ORDER. Head-Quarters, Amberstburg, August 14, 1812.

Major-General Brock announces his arrival to the Troops quartered in the Western District, and directs officers in command will immediately transmit returns of

their respective corps.

The Major-General congratulates the Troops on the evacuation of the country by the enemy. He is perfuaded that nothing but the spirit manifested by those who have remained doing duty, and Colonel Proctor, have compelled him to so disgraceful a retreat. partment, are entitled to his best upon his communicating with the

thanks for their judici us management of the Indians, and for the example of gallantry which they have uniformly shewn before the enemy.

The Major-General cannot avoid expressing his surprize at the numei ous defertions which have occurred from the ranks of the militia, to which circumstance the long stay of the enemy on this fide of the river must in a great measure be ascribed. He is willing to believe, that their conduct proceeded from an anxiety to get in their harvests and not from any predilection for the principles or Government of the United States. He requests officers commanding corps to transmit to him the names of fuch Militia-men who have remained faithful to their oath and duty, in order that immediate measures may be taken, to dildharge their arrears of puy. The enemy being still in the neighborhood, the whole physical force of the country will be employed to drive him to fuch a distance as will insure its tranquillity. Officers commanding Militia corps are responsible that every individual bound to embody himself according to law, does immediately repair to his station, in default of which he will be treated as a deferter, and subjected to all the penalties of the new Militia Law.

Captains Muir, Tallon & Chambers, 41st Regiment, Capt. Glegg, 49th Regiment, Captain Mockler, Royal Newfoundland Regiment, and Captain Dixon, Royal Engineers, are appointed to the rank of Majors, fo lorg as the local fervice on which they are employed con-

tinues. iff Brigade. The Troops in the Western district will be formed in-Lieut. General St. George, to confift of detachments of the Regul Newfoundland Regiment, and of the Kent, 1st and 2d Regiments of

Effex Militia. 2d Brigade. The second brigade under the command of Major Chambers, confisting of fifty men of the 41st Regiment and the whole of the detachments of the York, Lincoln, Oxford and Norfolk Militia.

3d Brigade. The third brigade under the command of Major Tallon, will confift of the remainder of the 41st Regiment.

Colonel Proctor will have the charge of the whole line under the orders of the Major-General.-James Givins, Efq. late Captain of the 5th Regiment, is appointed Provincial Aid-de-Camp, with the rank of Major in the Militia.
