# Foreign Intelligence.

Lord Wellington's Official Account of the Battles in Salamanca.

> London Gazette Extraordinary. WAR DEPARTMENT,

Downing fireet, August 16, 1812. Lord Clinton, aid de camp to the Earl of Wellington, arrived this morning at the war department, with defoatches addressed by his lordship to earl Bathurst, dated 21st, 24th, and 28th ultimo, of which the following are extract :

Cabrerizos, near Salamanca, July 21. In the course of the 15th and 16th, the enemy moved all their troops to the right of their polition on the Douro, and their army was concentrated between Toro and San Roman.

A confiderable body passed the Douro at Toro. on the evening of the 16th, and I moved the allied army to the left on that night,
