GORDON DRUMMOND Esquire, President, administering the Government of the Province of Upper Canada, and Lieutenant General Commanding His Majesty's Forces within the same.

To all to whom these Presents shall come.

KNOW YE, that finding it expedient and necessary to prohibit the Distillation of Spirits, Strong Waters and Low Wines, from any Wheat, Corn or other Grain, Meal or Flour within this Province; I do hereby, under the authority of the several Acts of the Parliament of this Province, in force for that purpose, and by an advice and consent of His Majesty's Executive Council, for the affairs of this Province, prohibit the Distillation of Spirits, Strong Waters and low wines from any Wheat, Corn or other Grain, Meal or Flour within this Province, from the expiration of five days after the Date of this Proclamation, in the Home District and of ten days in every other District of this Province, to the first day of July now next ensuing, under the penalties and Forfeitures by the said Acts imposed.

And I do for that purpose issue this my Proclamation, declaring the Provisions and restrictions of the said Acts so far as they relate to the Distillation of Spirits, Strong Waters and Low Wines, from Wheat, Corn or other Grain, Meal or Flour, within this Province, to be in force from the time and for the period above mentioned.

MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

1. HIS Honor the President, and Lieutenant General Commanding, being desirous, that the General Staff of the Militia, of Upper Canada, should be placed on the same footing, with Officers, holding similar situations, in the Lower Province, is pleased to direct, that they shall have the same Pay, and Garrison and Field Allowances, as are granted to Officers of the General Staff, of His Majesty's Regular Forces, serving in this Province; with such exceptions, only, as shall be especially communicated to the Departments concerned.

These Regulations to take effect from the 25th of December last, inclusive.

2. His Honor, the President, is pleased to direct, that the Sum of Two Pounds, Halifax Currency, each, be paid for the apprehension of Deserters from the Incorporated Militia; which is to be immediately issued, by the District Paymaster, or Paymaster of the Corps, upon the Certificate of the Commanding Officer of the Post, where

such Deforter shall be lodged for confinement; upon the Oath, before a Magistrate, of the person, apprehending the Deforter, that he is such.

This Certificate is to be considered a sufficient Voucher, for the Sum of £2. being charged in the Paymaster's Accounts.

His Honor, the President, is pleased to signify his desire, that all Officers, on duty, shall appear, in a Scarlet Jacket, with Dark Blue Facings, Yellow Buttons, Gold Lace, round the Collar, and Cuffs, only, and plain Gold Epauettes according to their Rank, Grey Pantaloon, or Trowsers, &c. Cap, according to His Majesty's Regulation, for Regiments of the Line: but, where such cannot be provided, Round Hats will be permitted, with a Regulation Feather, Cockade, &c. on the left side.— The Jacket to be made, according to The King's Order, for Corps of the Line.

The Uniform of General Staff Officers, and of Departments, is to be similar to that of the General Staff, and Departments, of His Majesty's Regular Forces.
